Owned and operated since it was first laid out by Birmingham Township, the City of Birmingham has the general legal ownership of the park.

Shorter Term Would Imperil Standing With North Central Association, Board Of Education Told

MORE SCRIP, LOAN ARE CONSIDERED

Should the Birmingham public schools close before the end of the nine-month term June 15, their standing as an accredited member of the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges would be imperiled.

This information, given to the Board of Education at a special meeting Saturday afternoon by Superintendent Charles W. Jandell, immediately became the Board's chief consideration in its discussion here, because of the district financial plight, the school should be closed earlier than scheduled.

Mr. Jandell said he had been told by George Carrouthers of Ann Arbor, director of the Board of Education of the National Association of Secondary Schools, that if the county cannot support a nine-month school term, it must suffer the consequences.

By this, Mr. Jandell said, Mr. Carrouthers meant that continuation of the measure reporting on the part of a member of the Association would imperil that member's connection with the organization, although it would probably not be forced to give up its membership immediately or without a warning.

Loss of membership in the Association of Secondary Schools would not be admitted to colleges and universities of the state without examinations. This would not apply to entrance examinations for Michigan as long as Birmingham remains on the university's accredited list.

Further, Mr. Jandell said, loss of membership in the Association would reflect "a general lowering of the standards of the schools of the North Central Association is the body which recently dropped the University of Detroit from its list."

Despite the Association's warning, the Board of Education Tuesday was not convinced that the current school year should be continued. The fact that two members were absent prevented any final action being taken, but this will probably be done at the Board's regular meeting tonight.

With approximately \$10,000 on hand at present, the board has estimated that about \$20,000 more in cash will be needed to keep the school open until June 15, unless a further burden is placed on the teachers by asking them to accept more than their regular salary.
