**Drunken Driver May Face Second Charge**

Car He Was Driving Had Been Stolen, Police Learn After Court Passes Sentence

When Alvin Thompson, 31 years old, of 32 South Skirley street, Pontiac, leaves the County Jail after serving a 60-day term for drunk driving, it may be only to be arrested as an automobile thief.
