What The Women Think About It
Each week, The Eccentric asks several women chosen at random from the telephone book, to answer a question of general interest in Birmingham.

The question this week: What suggestions do you have for keeping the Community House open if the funds raised in the Roll Call are insufficient.

Mrs. George Sawyer, 528 Park street: "If the Community House Roll Call committee cannot make its quota, it should take the opportunity to economize. I see no reason for the House to be open during the summer. It isn't that people don't appreciate the value of the Community House that is the problem. It is simply that we don't have the money to give."

Mrs. Joseph Smiley, 4356 Elmwood avenue: "I think that the Community House should be kept open. The employment office is especially useful. I don't see why people who are looking for help and to those who are looking for work. It would be too bad to discontinue that service."

Mrs. Robert D. Peebles, 284 West-Brown street: "I think that, by all means, the Community House should be kept open, though with the exception of the employment office. I don't see that as an advantage of keeping it open during July and August. By keeping the House closed during those two months some money could be saved."

Mrs. D. H. Thompson, 892 Purdy street: "I do wish that the Community House could be kept open. Perhaps by asking a small charge of the clubs each time they use the House, and a small charge of each person who uses the House at any time, the situation might be remedied. The children, who probably get as much pleasure from the House as adults, would be glad to give a small portion of their allowances, say 5 cents, if the situation could be explained to them as being a very urgent but temporary need."

Mrs. J. G. Wilcox, 1258 Bird avenue: "I think that every effort should be made to keep the Community House open. The clubs should pay for the use of the House each time they meet. In that way a large share of the expense could be taken care of."

Mrs. Frank G. Kane, 419 Lake Park drive: "Surely we want the House kept open, if there were some way of getting in touch with the persons who were not reached by members of the Roll Call committee, a large part of the necessary money might be available."

Mrs. G. R. Norton, 1931 Madison avenue: "Of course, I feel that the House should be kept open. If the different organizations and groups were charged a small sum each time they used the House, the expenses might be met. Moreover, they might take more interest in the House itself under that plan, and be more careful in using it."

Mrs. W. D. Thompson, Phitson Mile road: "I was on the Board which helped to build the Community House, and of course I'm all for it. If some of the important clubs and groups using the House would make themselves responsible for its maintenance for one month—and devise their own schemes of raising money, enough might be made to keep going from one month to the next for the whole year."

Mrs. Harry W. Taylor, Brady Lane: "The Community House is very helpful in many ways and it should be kept open. Parties and benefits of one kind and another might be helpful. A children's party, once a month, at which the children could get acquainted and local entertainment could be furnished would bring in quite a bit of money. Also, knitting and sewing groups might meet for the purpose of raising money, and thus bring in some revenue for the House."
