25 Awarded Pins As Band Members

CRANE TRACKMEN WIN FIRST MEET

Make Impressive Start in Topping Muskegon Junior College, 72-50

Track at Cranbrook School got off to a fine start Saturday when the Crane defeated Muskegon Junior College in the opening meet of the year, 72 to 50.

Bob Gilray, in addition to being the high point man of the day, with 15 counters obtained by winning two first places, a second, and two thirds, succeeded in breaking the school record in the 120 yard high hurdles, leading the field to the tape in 16.1 seconds.

The Crane also secured a potential winner in the pole vault, one of the events in which Cranbrook expected to be especially weak. Louis O'Connell tied for first place with Osterhaus of Muskegon at 10 feet 2 1/2 inches. Each team won six first places and for two more, but the Cranes were able to place a far greater number of men in the runner-up and third positions. Cranbrook stood out in the weight events, where Muskegon excelled in the dashes and hurdles.

Schwarze, Baldwin Ace, Has Low Score, But Team Trails By Point

A strong quartet of Pontiac High School golfers defeated the Baldwin High School squad, 6 1/2 to 5 1/2, Saturday morning on the Wayne Golf Course. Pontiac, The Baldwin team now has a 5.00 rating, having won its first meet from Lincoln High School of Eureka.

Fred Schwarz, Baldwin ace, again shot the low score of the meet, routing the course in 74 and winning three points for the Maroon team. His opponent, Stewart, shot an 81.

Holquist, the Chief's number two man, was only one shot above Schwarz, and playing against Smith of Baldwin, won all three of the points. Good, another Baldwin player, was able to win only a half point from Nelson, and Porteous, the Maple number four man permitted Yeager to win the first nine holes and one point, but took the second nine and the 18 to add two points to the Baldwin count.

If satisfactory arrangements can be made, the Baldwin team will be the guests of the Royal Oak High School golfers this afternoon, and next Wednesday Wayne High School will be host to the Maples at Wayne.

MAPLES WIN INITIAL TEST

Baldwin Trackmen More Than Double Score On Wayne High

An untried Maroon and White track team of Baldwin High School took its initial test last Friday afternoon at Wayne and came off much better than had been expected. The Baldwin outfit, with Wayne High school furnishing the opposition in a dual meet, left its rivals in the dust before the meet was half over, and at the completion of the contest was ahead, 12 1/3 to 31 2/3.

To say that Birmingham was head and shoulders above Wayne isn't to say that the Baldwin squad performed brilliantly. Friday's meet gave the Maroons an excellent chance to show how they could perform in competition, but that's about all. The Wayne team was no match for the Baldwin outfit. In only three of the 12 events did a

Baldwin Enters Triangular Meet

Baldwin High School's track team will compete in its only triangular meet of the season Friday afternoon when Coach Frankly Whitney will take his squad to Mt. Clemens to meet the Mt. Clemens High School and Grosse Pointe High School teams. The meet will start at 3:30 o'clock.

Coach Whitney, profiting by the results of the Maroon and White dual last Friday, will make several changes in his entries.

Wayne boy win first place, and the losers were awarded the same number of seconds.

Times and distances made were far from outstanding. The closest of the performers came to equal a state record won in the 100-yard dash, when Donaldson, Baldwin's dash star, won in 10.3 seconds. Donaldson was high point man of the meet, accounting for 1 1/3 of the Maroon total. He led first in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes, and ran on the winning 880-yard relay team.

If the Baldwin team doesn't turn out to be a winner this year, there's good reason to believe that it will be one next season. Of the 15 Maroon men who played in the Wayne meet, 11 of them are sophomores or juniors and will be available to Coach Frankly Whitney for his squad in 1935.

Last year, in spite of the fact that it won the state Class B championship, the Baldwin tracksters were weak in three events—the shot, the pole vault and the 440-yard dash. In two of these, the Maroons are still not very strong. Coach Whitney has still to find a first-rate performer in the 440 and Harrington, the only man who has shown any possibilities in the shot, has still considerable distance to add to his throw before he will be a consistent point winner. The pole vault problem has apparently been solved and probably will remain solved for the next three years. Three sophomores, Porteous, McElbride and Hinton, all show great promise in this event.
