PICARD SPEAKS AT DEM RALLY

U. S. Senatorial Candidate Lauds Roosevelt; Lacy Fails To Appear

Claiming that President Roosevelt and the Democratic Party are speaking to bring Jeffersonian social justice to the American people, Frank A. Picard, Democratic candidate for the United States Senate, addressed a rally of approximately 150 men and women in the Baldwin High School auditorium Saturday night. Judge Arthur J. Lacy, candidate for Governor on the same ticket, failed to appear on the program. Draper S. Allen, local Democrat and chairman of the County Democratic Committee, presided.

In the auditorium, which was appropriately decorated with flags and banners of the various candidates running for national, state and county offices, Mr. Picard outlined his policies for economic recovery in the United States. He paid tribute to the United States' life and ability of his Republican opponent, Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg, a disciple of the Hamiltonian theory of government, which represents capitalism, and I am a believer in the Jeffersonian theory of government which puts human rights above property rights.

Blames G. O. P. For Crisis
Mr. Picard presented statistics to show how the Roosevelt administration had improved business conditions during its 18 months incumbency at Washington, and argued that "the only safe way to work out of this depression is for the party in power to attempt measures that are of equal concern to the common man."

"The Republicans had been in power from 1920 to 1932, and during this period we witnessed the bringing on of the greatest economic disaster ever faced by our nation," he said. "Not only did the Republicans are to blame for our present situation, but I am asking for your vote because I favor the extension of the Roosevelt program of recovery. My opponent in this campaign has voted against me and against others of our President's policies."

"I do not care about my own personal political fortunes, but I am much concerned about the state of the nation. We have lost President Roosevelt's sympathies are with the masses of the people. Our party is pledged to put them through in defense of the common man and woman. And on that basis I go before you in this election."

Webster Speaks
Charles DeWitt of Pontiac, Democratic nominee for Congress, also spoke in defense of the Roosevelt program. He called himself a friend of labor, and pledged himself to untrifling effort to bring about peace between capital and labor. "The New Deal is the same deal that our forefathers established on the shores 150 years ago," he said.

"This policy is based on the belief that government exists for the people, and not people for the government."
Eugene Donahue, Detroit attorney, and a man high in the state Knights of Columbus organization, spoke briefly for the election of Judge Lacy, while Ben Hughes made a similar plea for the candidacy of Attorney-General Patrick H. O'Brien.

County candidates who were present and who spoke for themselves, included John D. McGillis, for county clerk; Frank Fortino and Charles A. Holman, for circuit court commissioners; Bruce Buchanan, for drain commissioner; DeWitt C. Davis and Jacob B. Sparks, for county coroners.

The rally was put on under the direction of Mr. Allen, Franklin O. Day, J. Mark Hardin, DeWitt Thompson, Thomas Thurber, and J. Brownell.

An Enabling Act doesn't change a thing in any county," he explained. "It is merely an enabling act which allows the people of any county to make changes by approving them at the polls."
"Thus it paves the way for reform in our system of county and township government, which has remained unchanged for 84 years, and which is now an exact, tallowing candle, analagous to stagcoach system that only someone with a mouth as big as Joe E. Brown's could laugh at and deride properly."

"When two or more candidates are to be elected to the same or like office, such as circuit court commissioners, etc., and the voter desires to vote for a candidate or candidates not on his party ticket for such office, he must mark a cross in the circle under his party name, and mark a cross in the square before the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom he desires to vote on the other ticket or tickets, and also there shall be marked a cross in the square before the name or names of the candidate or candidates for such office on his party ticket; he shall be deemed to have crossed off the name of each candidate for such office in front of which he has marked a cross. Get it?"
