TEACHERS TO GIVE SHOE FUND BENEFIT

Club Makes Plans For Third Annual Bridge To Aid Children

Birmingham school teachers have been doing their bit to lighten the welfare burden for the past three years by holding an annual bridge party for the benefit of the Teachers' Club shoe fund. This year it will be held Wednesday evening, Nov. 21, at the Community House, with the welfare committee of the Teachers' Club as its sponsor. The personnel of the committee in charge includes Miss Merle Taylor, F. Morse Cooke, Mrs. Aris Horwath, Miss Alfreda Purchase, Miss Helen Gross and Miss Violet Hansen. As a result of last year's benefit, the proceeds of \$92 were used to supply needy families with shoes so that the children might be regular in their school attendance. The shoe fund maintained by the Teachers' Club is used for school children only, and is distributed through the Community House.
