AMENDMENT TALK HEARD

U. of M. Professor Opposes Nos. 2, 3, 5 and 6; Suggests No. 4

Voters must not judge an amendment by "the company it keeps on the ballot," Arthur W. Bromage, assistant professor of political science at the University of Michigan, cautioned members of the Birmingham League of Women Voters and their guests in an address at the Community House Monday evening.

The fear that objections raised to some of the six proposed amendments to the State Constitution appearing on the ballot for the election next Tuesday might result in blind opposition to all of them, was expressed by Professor Bromage.

"Prior to a month ago, there was little opposition to amendments to the State Constitution," he said, "but since that time, opposition has spread like wildfire, with the result that some are now urging a general negative vote for all the amendments."

Professor Bromage set forth both favorable and unfavorable aspects of each of the six amendments. As a member of the committee which drafted the fourth amendment, providing for the reorganization of county government, he explained in detail the evils of the present system which the adoption of home rule government by counties would seek to eliminate.

Amendments two and three were described as the "storm center" of the general opposition.

"While such limitations on gasoline and weight taxes on automobiles as a member of the committee considered desirable to protect the automobile industry, these amendments if adopted, would deprive the State of \$12,000,000 in revenue, with no other major source of taxation available," Professor Bromage declared.

Cites Welfare Burden

"I believe these amendments are the natural outcome of a feeling that the Legislature has gone too far in taxing the automobile, but still, one cannot get away from the fact that the State cannot afford to lose so great a source of revenue in the face of present conditions. The welfare load is still one of its heaviest burdens."

"What I fear also is that there is no end to this type of taxation, and that it could eventually deprive the State of its powers to tax. There would be no actual cash saving as far as the price of gasoline is concerned, should amendment two be adopted. Michigan has, at the present time, a relatively low gasoline tax. In the bulk of the states, the average tax is 3.3 cents, so that Michigan, with its 3 cent tax, is actually below the average."
