Maroons, Still Without A Victory, Will Meet Strong Class C Team Friday

In its final game before the annual Thanksgiving Day clash with Royal Oak, the Baldwin High School football team will encounter the St. Clair High eleven Saturday afternoon at St. Clair. The Maroons have still to win their first game this season.

St. Clair is reported as having a first rate team again this season, and in view of the Baldwin record to date, should enter the tilt as the favored eleven. The game will start at 2:30 P. M.

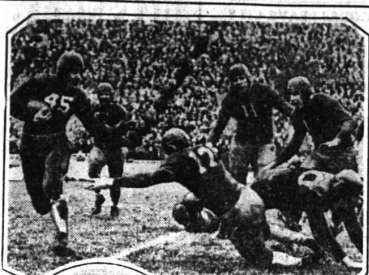

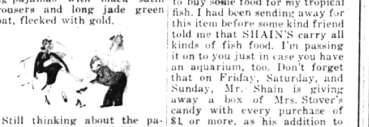
