PLAIN NEW RETREAT HOUSE AT MANRESA

Work To Be Started Before Jan. 1 On Building To Replace One Destroyed By Fire

Work on a new retreat house to replace the one destroyed by fire March 22 at Manresa, on Woodward avenue in Bloomfield Hills, is expected to be started before the first of next year, it has been announced by the Rev. F. W. Cogley, S. J., spiritual director of the retreat.

A campaign to raise funds with which to finance the project has been carried on for the past several months by members of the Laymen's Retreat League, Father Cogley said.

The proposed new building is of English Gothic architecture, and will be of fireproof construction. The architect to be employed will be adequate to accommodate 35 retreatants for a week-end. Retreats are held in the form of business and professional men, fraternal organizations, and others. Many of the members of the retreats are from Detroit, but there also come from Jackson, Battle Creek, Saginaw, Fort Howard, Pontiac, Mt. Clemens and other cities.

The architect for the new building is Aloys F. Herman. The ruins of the old building, which have been cleared away, and the first stone of the new structure will probably be completed in six months, according to Father Cogley.

As a benefit for the new structure, the Laymen's Retreat League is arranging a pre-Thanksgiving party to be held in the University of Detroit gymnasium. Members of the committee are E. W.
