Fashion Show To Display Past And Present Modes

Gowns that reflect the social glory of other days will be seen in "the Century of Fashion" to be presented under auspices of the League of St. James' Women at the Community House Friday at 8 P. M. A novel feature of the show will be that men's fashions of various periods during the past 100 years will also be displayed, worn by male models.

Among the gowns loaned is one belonging to Mrs. H. S. Sibley of Willis street, which was worn originally by her grandmother in 1840. Another was the gown in which the mother of Mrs. Winthrop Allen was presented at the court of St. James.

Bathing costumes as grandmother were them will be included in a parade of beach fashions dated back 60 years. The riding habit, worn in the side-saddle era, will be seen in a collection of riding costumes for the past half century, concluding with present day styles. For the more elaborate portion of the show, there will be a procession of wedding gowns beginning with arial attire of 1850. Important among masculine fashions will be a wedding outfit worn by a bridegroom of the past, in which George T. Hendrie will be seen. There will also be peg-top trousers and a brown derby which may be a relic of the original mode.

The old-fashioned bicycle on which youth of the past peddled forth for an airing, will be included, as well as a modern "bike".

Not only will fashions of other days be seen in the parade, but modern styles will have a prominent place as well. Healy's will stage a modern style show with their own models.
