57-Year-Old Birmingham Man To Be Examined On Attempted Assault Charge. Fred E. Wilson, of 982 Stanley street, proprietor of the Fourteen Mile Inn, a beer garden and restaurant at Woodward avenue and the Fourteen Mile road, will be given an examination Friday morning by Justice Forbes S. Hassell on an attempted assault charge.

Wilson, who is 57 years old, was arrested last Thursday on the complaint of one of his waitresses, who claims the attempted attack occurred when he offered to take her home after he refused to do so. When he refused to do so, she jumped out of the car and over on eye and a slight concussion.

The waitress is a married woman and lives in Birmingham. Wilson was released under \$1,500 bond, pending the examination.
