

Maples Defeat St. Clair For First Win In 7 Games

Score Two Touchdowns In Last Quarter For 12-6 Victory; Johnny Owens Stars

A seemingly rejuvenated Baldwin High School football team, after losing its first six starts, came from behind in the last quarter, scored twice and won its first contest of the year Saturday afternoon, 12 to 6, against the St. Clair gridiron, was the final tilt on the Baldwin schedule before the Maple take on Royal Oak High School in their annual Thanksgiving Day game, scheduled this year for Pierce Field.

Coach Miles W. Robinson started a team of second string players and substitutes, and although this was not the combination that did the scoring, it played as good a brand of ball as any the varsity had displayed in any of its previous games. And the regulars, which Coach Robinson sent into the fray later, gave a much better account of themselves than they had done at any time since the season began.

Four Clair outfit took the lead late in the initial stanza when Hock, halfback, toted the oval over the goal line from the Baldwin 20-yard mark, where St. Clair had recovered a Baldwin fumble. An attempted line play for the extra point failed.

Crises Recover Fumble

After being thus scored on in the early part of the game, the Cranes opened up, and at the end of the quarter had the ball on the University 40-yard line. Patterson, fullback, and the Cranes' varsity succeeded in making a first down to the 30. On the next play, the Cleveland runner fumbled and John Gilray recovered for Cranbrook.

The Blue and Gray took immediate advantage of this break, and on the first play, Jim Packard dropped back after a fake at the line and tossed a long pass to Willard Parker, Crane end, who caught it on the University 20-yard stripe and crossed the goal line standing up. Parker successfully booted the point-after to the score.

For the remainder of the half the two teams played on even terms.

The Cranes received the kickoff, but could do little on offense, and University took the ball in the middle of the second quarter and passed to the Brookes' right. Here Cranbrook made a determined stand, but on fourth down Barker scored from the one-foot line and then kicked the point-after.

Gascogne Again Scores

Superior weight and size began to count for University in the fourth quarter, a concerted drive setting their five first downs in the Gascogne again scored on reverse play off tackle, and Quarterback Barker kicked the extra point.

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LAST MINUTE GOAL WINS SOCCER TILT

Crane's Season Ends In 3-2 Defeat At Hands Of Cleveland University School
