CITY LACKING RELIEF FUNDS

Has No Money To Help Offset County Deficit, Parry Tells Skelton

The City of Birmingham has no money with which to help offset an anticipated deficit in Oakland County's welfare fund appropriation from the state for November. This is the summary of a reply sent this week by City Manager James W. Parry to S. S. Skelton, county relief administrator, in answer to the latter's warning that the welfare program in Oakland this month may have to be drastically curtailed unless individual cities and townships share part of the burden.

In a letter to Mr. Parry, the administrator revealed that the county's allotment from the state for November is \$290,000, which is \$52,000 short of the estimated requirement. Unless the deficit is offset, Mr. Skelton said, all Work Wage projects may have to be stopped and food allowances cut 11 per cent.

The case load is increasing "at an alarming rate," Mr. Skelton wrote, disclosing that it jumped from 7,408 to 8,568 in October, and estimating that it would reach 10,000 by the end of November. Mr. Skelton said he had requested Dr. William R. Haber, state relief administrator, to revise Oakland County's allotment, but added: "It is evident that if its situation is to be met this month, it will be necessary for you to turn over funds which you have which have been collected for this purpose."

Attached was a letter from Dr. Haber, stating that "the State Relief Administration advises that no state and federal funds will be available after Nov. 15 unless the arrangements for local contribution will have been revised and approved before that date."

In reply to Mr. Skelton, Mr. Parry wrote that "no funds are available from this city to apply on the anticipated deficit." A welfare levy of \$7,100 was included in the 1934-35 budget, he said, but of this amount, only \$2,545 has been collected, whereas \$4,773.47 has actually been spent by the city since July 1 in supplementary relief.

"These figures do not include in expenditures certain items chargeable against welfare which have not yet been segregated in our accounts," Mr. Parry wrote, "nor items incurred in October not yet passed through for payment. In other words, the deficit (in the city's own welfare fund) is actually larger than here revealed."

"The welfare activity of the city aims not at duplication of the city, state and federal activity, but rather at supplementing it. Expenditures therefore may not be in accordance with their policies and restrictions."

Mr. Parry has also informed Charles R. Godfrey, county poor commissioner, that the city will pay nothing for the hospitalization of indigents.

"We are requesting that all township supervisors and city officials forward to the Superintendent of Poor any money available from their welfare funds to apply on hospitalization of indigents during the year Oct. 1, 1933, to Sept. 30, 1934," Mr. Godfrey wrote to Mr. Parry. Payment either in full or in part was requested, and Mr. Godfrey explained the money was to go to the hospitals.

To this request, Mr. Parry replied: "No levy was made in this city for such purpose and no funds collected. It is our understanding that hospitalization of indigents is a county charge, administered by and paid for by the county."

Wing Lake Residents To Get Bus Service

Beginning Monday, the Michigan System will extend its passenger bus system to Wing Lake, as was announced yesterday by A. Coryell, Birmingham manager.

At first there will be four buses leaving Wing Lake daily for Detroit. The first, leaving at 5:30 A. M., will be an express, and the second, at 8:35 A. M., will be a local, traveling to Detroit via Royal Oak. The other two buses will leave Wing Lake at 3:45 P. M. and 6:20 P. M. daily.

Leaving Birmingham from the corner of Maple and Woodward avenues, buses will start for Wing Lake daily at 7:15 P. M., 8 A. M., 3:30 P. M. and 6 P. M. The 6 P. M. bus will be an express, leaving Wing Lake, leaving Detroit at 4:57 P. M.

More buses will be added to the service if the demand warrants, Mr. Coryell said.
