Wayne University Professor To Speak From Point Of View Of Consumer

The NRA from three distinctive points of view will be the topic for discussion at a meeting of the civic class of the Birmingham League of Women Voters at the Community House Monday at 10.

The history of the NRA will be reviewed by Mrs. F. F. McKinney, director of the department of economic welfare. Mrs. L. Ford Merritt, chairman of living costs, will discuss "Codes Under the NRA." The third speaker, whose subject will be "The NRA and the Consumer," will be E. W. McFarland, professor of economics and sociology at Wayne University.

Those wishing to make a day of the affair may attend luncheon at the Metamora Club House from 12 to 2. The races are scheduled to begin promptly at 2.

The main event of the day will be the President's Cup Steeplechase, for which the trophy is the gift of Frank J. Navin. Other events on the card include a quarter mile dash; the Oxford, a mile flat race; the Bloomfield Steeplechase, a one and three-quarter mile race over brush for qualified hunters; the Lapeer, a one-quarter mile flat race for horses owned and ridden by Metamora farmers; the President's Cup Steeplechase, a two mile race over brush, open to all horses, and the Gladale, a one-quarter mile flat race.
