Bank News Banks in many parts of the country report that large bills . . . \$100, \$500 and \$1,000 denominations were withdrawn by depositors in many cities during the depression period of the last year or two. The risk of loss of a bill representing such a large sum of money has been a constant worry to these people and it is with much relief that the bills are now returned to the banks for deposit. General improvement in business and the insurance of bank deposits are contributing factors in the return of this money to the banks.

Under a new law which became effective June 16, 1933, no executive officer of a National Bank may borrow from the bank of which he is an executive officer. Under this law, all National Banks are forbidden to make loans to an officer of the bank. Any executive officer of a National Bank may borrow from the bank if he is required under the law to make a report in writing to the Chairman of the Board of Directors stating the date and the amount and purpose of the loan.

It costs your bank money . . . each dollar you write on a check . . . it must be inspected carefully to make sure that you really signed it . . . to make sure that it is paid to the correct person . . . to pay cash out for it. It is a sum expended by your bank to make a record of each check you write . . . each deposit you make on each check on another bank that you deposit . . . how can your bank be paid for this expense . . . the income from your money on deposit which you are not using . . . therefore, keep an adequate balance in your bank account.

A woman in Kansas deposited \$1 in the Savings Department of her bank a short time ago under instructions that it be left on deposit to draw compound interest for 100 years at the end of that time the sum then on deposit be used to pay the debts of the world. It is estimated that the interest earnings on the \$1 deposit will amount to more than six hundred trillion dollars in one-half of that time, or 750 years. One trillion dollars is one thousand billion . . . the sum greater than the total debt of all the countries of the world.

A short time ago Government engravers were hard at work chiseling out plates for million dollar bills . . . think of it, a cool million . . . all in one bill . . . for most of us who never see anything larger than a twenty . . . that if one of them should slip into your pocket so you could crumple it up with the \$1 bill you usually have there! A pleasant thought.

Banks of the country are not holding back credit . . . and thereby withholding a return to normal business conditions . . . in talking to Texas Bankers at their State convention the other day, Mr. O'Connor, Secretary of the Treasury pointed out that reserve cash on hand in the banks established a new high record in recent months . . . the Treasury is doing much to bring credit available than those directing sound enterprises are able or willing to employ. In the past year or more, changes in the American banking system have been widely discussed and analyzed by many writers and talked of regulations, and other changes in the banking system which are supported by all dependable and progressive bankers, but frequently in such discussions fundamental facts are overlooked . . . our regulations of themselves do not correct evils . . . will not assure safety of depositors' funds . . . nor a helpful service to bank depositors. These are the product of a sound and experienced management in each bank . . . a very important fact that is commonly overlooked is the genuine and helpful service of the community banker and his bank to the growth and progress of America in the past century . . . During the past hundred years thousands of dots of habitation on our landscape have been able to grow and prosper . . . to build modern homes . . . values, because the savings of the people in secure and conservative investments into the necessary capital through savings accounts in the local banks across road settlements grew into villages and villages into towns by this process . . . If the savings of each community are to be forwarded to the larger centers to build a huge pyramid of credit, the individual in the smaller community in need of credit may find it very difficult to obtain . . . a government or corporation controlled and guided by application forms and figures will not save and prosper . . . a man of thrift and character nor a like understanding of local civic need . . . The individual bank in the community has performed many valuable services to the progress of the nation and perhaps not the least of such service has been its genuine helpfulness to the community and its citizens.

BOGUE ANSWERS REYNOLDS To the Editor: There appeared in your paper a report on a letter to the editor made by the sheriff of Oakland County before the County Republican Women's Club. The article read in part as follows: "Reynolds laid his failure to get anyone in Oakland County directly in opposition of the Democratic administration. . . ."

The sheriff said he would prefer defeat to being re-elected along with "the present setup." If Pence isn't elected, I don't want to win because I won't be able to get any place with law enforcement, and you will be spending my money for nothing."

I am surprised to hear an admission of this kind from the highest executive officer of the county. It is one thing to fail at law enforcement, but the admission of such a failure has a possibility of more serious consequences than the actual failure itself. The one great factor which in my opinion has a tendency to prevent crime is the respect and fear which criminals have for law enforcing officers. That respect and fear should not be diminished by admissions of incompetence.

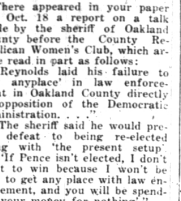
I wish to say in fairness to the staff of fine deputies that the prosecutor's office has been very little complained of in the county which have not been taken care of promptly and properly by the sheriff's department. While there may not have been as many arrests as has been the case in previous years, it is not indicative of failure of that law enforcing body.

Not only am I surprised that the sheriff should say that he has made a failure at law enforcement, I am more surprised that he should consent to tell any individual body of people that the Democratic administration is responsible for such failure. The sheriff's duties are clearly defined by statute. Only in rare cases is it tant or even consult the prosecuting attorney before making an arrest. He may make an arrest when a felony or misdemeanor is committed in his presence, and may always make an arrest whether a felony or not when he has reasonable cause to believe that a felony has been committed and that such person has committed it.

The prosecutor's office has always cooperated with the sheriff's office, and in every case has authorized warrants requested by the sheriff's department. I would be pleased to have you publish the foregoing answer relative to Mr. Reynolds's statement. ARTHUR P. BOGUE, Prosecuting Attorney.

EXPLORER OF JUNGLES SPEAKS AT INSTITUTE Stories and motion pictures of remote jungles on the Upper Amazon will be brought to the Detroit Institute of Arts Sunday at 3:30 P. M. in an illustrated lecture by Dr. William Montgomery McGovern, bronzed young author, explorer and scientist. Dr. McGovern will tell of canibals with deadly blowpipes and poisoned darts, natives who live on a diet of ants and caterpillars, fever-ridden country of dense jungles and swamps infested with vampire bats. He will show strange snakes, crocodiles and animals, and the jungle carpeted ruins of the Inca King, lost to the world for centuries. Camera strapped to his back, Dr. McGovern burst through vast areas of Brazilian wilderness to bring back his tales and pictures of life beyond the Andes. American-born, Dr. McGovern was educated at Oxford, the Sorbonne, and the University of Berlin. He speaks 12 languages and has written eight books.
