## OLD DAYS REVIVED BY CLUB MEMBERS

Delving into Early History, Reveals Amusing Incidents Of Other Times

How a metropolitan women's club of today gradually evolved from a "Ladies Literary Society" of a generation ago, was the history traced through reminiscence and anecdote by members of the Birmingham Women's Club at the opening meeting of the season held Tuesday afternoon at the Community House.

Going back to the founding of the club in 1890 by 15 former school teachers, Mrs. Harry Allen followed the club's career through changes that have been made of Birmingham a trim modern city instead of a village of scattered houses as it was when the organization began. Mrs. Allen is the daughter of Mrs. Nellie E. Clabe, second president of the club.

The object of the club, as quoted by Mrs. Allen from the secretary's book of the '30's, was "to promote general intelligence among its members and the study of literary and scientific subjects."

In pursuit of their aim, the club members chose programs somewhat staggering in comparison with those of today.

"Five typical light and airy subjects discussed in one evening," Mrs. Allen told the club, "were the War of Austrian Succession, the Slesian Wars, Seven Years War, Partition of Poland, and the Life of Kosciuszko. The last two topics were given by Mrs. Corson, mother of City Treasurer Harold H. Corson, and Mrs. Ethel Raynald, mother of Dr. George P. Raynald."

Among current issues considered by the club in early days were "The Servant Problem," "Humorists of Today," and a debate on the subject, "Resolved: That Scolding is Worse for the Home Than Bad Cooking," which suggests that some husbands of that day might have been club members.

Recollections of Miss Martha Baldwin, founder of Baldwin Public Library, who was hailed by old and young as "Mattie" as she rode about the village in a quaint low carriage, sheltered from the sun by a large tan parasol, and drawn by a sedate bay horse, were also given by Mrs. Allen in connection with the work of early members.
