

# Farmer-Labor Party, Led by Minnesota May Split Party Lines With Radicalism

NEW YORK.—Out of the Middle West comes rumbles of a third party ticket to contest the rightness of the Roosevelt administration and the status quo at the next election.  
The Farmer-Labor Party, with the state of Minnesota setting an example, threatens to split the support of the old party lines. No third party ticket ever has elected its own candidate, but in past elections it has done much to break up the vote on the two major candidates. Just hark back to 1912 and the "Bull Moose" days!  
The Farmer-Labor Party is more than a political ticket, however, more than political strategy. It is a new political philosophy—new and far more radical than ever has been advanced in this country as a strictly American doctrine.

**Native American**  
The leaders of the new party, which has already won over Minnesota, are American born, many of them descendants of early American aristocracy. But they propose a philosophy almost as radical as Communism. They claim it to be an American-inspired doctrine, however, and says and coming from the Soviet Union, Fascist Italy or Nazi Germany. They characterize it as an "American planned revolution—the only bulwark against a violent, headless upheaval that might drench America in the blood of a useless revolution—designed to win power for the people that this country may have a new birth of freedom."  
The philosophy and the platform of the Farmer-Laborites reads:

"We are at the end of an era. The world is in the throes of change. The old system is crumbling. We need courage and intelligence to build a new order. Modern technical developments in production enable man to fulfill his wants in abundance for the first time in human history. The equivalent of \$5,000 a year today or more can now be assured every family.  
"Yet men starve in the midst of plenty. Women are in rags while cotton is destroyed. Boys and girls wander homeless while houses are empty. Millions of Americans have lost their homes, farms and life savings.  
"Four per cent of our population controls 80 per cent of the wealth. A handful of bankers rule the lives and destinies of our people. The two old parties which govern us are paid and bossed by these same Wall Street bankers.  
"This cannot continue. We, the masses of the people, must rise up and win economic and political control. We must organize to establish a new social order, a scientifically planned system. We must produce to supply human needs instead of profit. We must be able to enjoy the wealth which modern science makes possible.

**HOW MANY CAN SOUTH WIN?**  
SOME PLAYERS never make opening pre-emptive bids. They claim that often it prevents small slam contracts from being bid and made. This is true in some instances, but in the long run hands obligating opening pre-emptive bids lose nothing by the process, frequently gain thereby, through shutting off opponents as well as partner from further bidding. The following hand should, however, have been bid 2-Spades, to discover what partner held.  
South made a pre-emptive bid of 4-Spades, which held. The opening lead was the Q of diamonds. How many can South win against the best subsequent defense?

♠ Q 3  
♥ 3 8  
♦ 6  
♣ K 8 7 6 5 3 2  
♠ 8 4 3  
♥ Q 7 5  
♦ Q 1 10 9  
♣ A 7 4  
♠ A K 10 9 7 6 2

South won the first trick with his Ace of diamonds. He took two top honor tricks in hearts. Dummy ruffed declarer's last heart. Declarer ruffed a club bid from dummy.

The declarer saw that he could not fall to win 4-odd, and so he could lose only to the missing 7 of trumps and another, even if all 6 missing spades were held by an opponent. Only a single diamond could be lost. Probably he would 5-odd, losing a single trump and one diamond. It would be fun seeing how many he could win. If the 7 fell there would be a small slam.

Although the odds were 3 to 2 against the lead of the Ace and K of trumps captured the missing 7, insuring a small slam. The 10 spade up the last outstanding spade. Ambition grows with

## MALARIA FATAL TO CALVIN M'CARROLL

Medical Missionary, 59, Had Lived 30 Years On Isle Of Cyprus; Rites Wednesday

Funeral services for Dr. Calvin M'Carroll, native of West Bloomfield Township and former medical missionary to the Isle of Cyprus, in the Mediterranean, were held Wednesday afternoon from the S. O. Wyle Bell Funeral

Home. Dr. M'Carroll, who was 59 years old, died Sunday afternoon in Harper Hospital, Detroit. Death was caused by malaria which Dr. M'Carroll contracted on his last visit to Cyprus, from which he returned about three weeks before his death.  
Dr. M'Carroll lived for 30 years in Cyprus, returning last winter. His wife, Mrs. Florence M'Carroll, also died May 29. Their home was at 636 Monroe street, Ann Arbor. Surviving are two sons, Dr. James C. O. M'Carroll, and Neil G., a recent graduate of the law school at the

University of Michigan; a daughter, Mrs. Grace M'Carroll of Ann Arbor, and three brothers, Dr. James M'Carroll of Denver, Col.; the Rev. Hugh M'Carroll of Los Angeles, Cal.; and the Rev. Walter M'Carroll of New York City. The late John M'Carroll of Birmingham was also a brother.  
The Rev. J. C. Mathews, pastor of the Southfield Reformed (Covenant) Presbyterian Church, officiated at the funeral services, and burial was in the churchyard.  
Dr. M'Carroll was a graduate of the Detroit College of Medicine in the class of 1904.
