Prof. Maurer To Direct Class in National, World Affairs; Meets Tuesdays

A non-credit course in "Current Books on Economic, Political and Social Problems" will be offered by the University of Michigan extension department the first semester of the current school year on Tuesday evenings at 8 o'clock in Christ Church Cranbrook.

The course will be directed by Prof. W. H. Maurer, and the class will hold its first meeting next Tuesday evening.

The class takes the form of a discussion group and is organized for all persons interested in making a broad study of the background for national and world affairs. Recent books are selected by the class for reports, reviews and round-table discussion.

Professor Maurer conducted a similar class in Ann Arbor last year, and the past two years in Detroit.

PEDESTRIAN HURT, DRIVER ARRESTED

Detroit Youth Denies Guilt For Hit on Cranbrook's Architectural Student

Eighteen-year-old Alex Kokoski, of 7289 Rosemont avenue, Detroit, will be given a trial on a charge of reckless driving by Justice Forbes S. Hazell in Municipal Court at 10 A. M. Friday as the outcome of an accident in which a pedestrian was run down and painfully injured by Kokoski's car.

The pedestrian was Ross Von Metzke, 27 years old, an architectural student at the Cranbrook Academy of Art and a resident of the Cranbrook Art Club. Von Metzke suffered lacerations about the head and face and the loss of some teeth when he was struck by Kokoski's car as he was walking across East Maple avenue at Woodward avenue at 12:50 A. M. Sunday.

Kokoski pleaded not guilty when arraigned on the reckless driving charge Monday morning and was held for trial under \$500 bond, which was not furnished. He was also charged with failure to carry an operator's license. He pleaded guilty to this, and was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail when unable to pay a \$50 fine.

Police claim Kokoski's brakes were defective, and that he ran through a red light before striking Von Metzke. He was travelling east on Maple avenue when the mishap occurred.

Von Metzke was taken to St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital, from which he was discharged Sunday night. Von Metzke's home is in Topeka, Kan. He is a pupil of Elsie Saarinen at the Academy.

Most Foods Devoid Of Value, Club Told

Birmingham Rotarians Monday noon were told that "most of our food people eat is almost entirely devoid of natural food values, and therefore most of the ailments of human beings are directly traceable to what they eat." The speaker was Paul Sampson, of Philadelphia, nationally known expert in dietetics. Following his talk at the Rotary Club, he spoke to the Rotary Annex, at the home of Mrs. Charles O'Connor, Avon road.

"God placed the proper elements of life in fruits and vegetables, and if we learn how to prepare them without cooking away their natural values, and serve them in the correct combinations, we would live longer and healthier lives," declared Mr. Sampson. "We have learned to feed livestock scientifically, and in many homes today the family dog is fed more beneficially than the very children in them."

Mr. Sampson was introduced by Harry E. Bissett, program chairman.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK TO BE OBSERVED HERE

The Birmingham fire department is preparing to join the nation in the observance of Fire Prevention Week, to be held this year from Oct. 7 to 13, according to Fire Chief Vernon W. Griffith.
