## A Woman's Impressions Of Century of Progress

(Several of the villages which comprise such a large portion of this year's World's Fair at Chicago are described by Mrs. Kahn in the following article, the second in a series she has written for The Eccentric on A Century of Progress Exposition.)

One hundred years ago, if a woman wished to see England, Germany or Switzerland, she would have had to board a sailing vessel and brave the four winds. But today, at the Chicago World's Fair, the mountain has come to the prophet.

And how it has come! Merrie England stands out vividly as the most colorful from every point of view. The English architecture has been faithfully reproduced and the same points of interest which one would seek on a trip to England are present here. The main group is built on the four sides of the central square where the English folk dances take place. These are beautifully executed by competent and well trained dancers in native costume.

Of course, there are rum toddy shops, where also Britishers assemble to sample their favorite sweet, jewelry shops and shops specializing in Egyptian antiques—eries are also in evidence.

**Globe Reproduced**

The piece de resistance, however, is the replica of the old Globe Theater. There it is, just as it appeared in the days of William Shakespeare. The players perform beautifully without any scenery, and the songs are sung without accompaniment. The repertoire includes Shakespeare's "As You Like It," "All's Well that Ends Well," "The Taming of the Shrew," "The Comedy of Errors," "The Merchant of Venice," "A Midsummer Night's Dream," "Julius Caesar," and "Macbeth," as well as Christopher "Dr. Faustus." The plays are cleverly cut and produced in one hour. To witness this attraction is worth a trip to the Fair.

The next important village in points of interest is the Black Forest of Germany. Here one finds the usual shops, with the characteristic waffles and sausage rolls indigenous to Bavaria.

From the beer garden of the largest restaurant the gigantic view of the mountains entrance, one, The Alps rise so abruptly, and with such splendid perspective, that they impart genuine atmosphere to the village.

Here, the entertainment consists of leekskating, solo and in groups, the always expertly, artistically and skillfully executed. There is also singing by German quartets and choruses.

## BOARD ADOPTS NEW SCHOOL CALENDAR

One-Week Vacations At Christmas—Exam Review Schedule For 1934-35

Christmas and Easter recesses of slightly more than one week each are provided for in a revised 1934-35 calendar for the Birmingham public schools, as adopted by the Board of Education Tuesday night.

The Board had adopted a calendar previously, but that had to be altered when the opening of schools for the first semester was delayed two weeks and set at Sept. 17.

The new calendar calls for a school year of nine months, ending June 1, 1935. Mid-year commencement is scheduled for Jan. 24, and spring commencement for June 6. The complete calendar follows:

Sept. 17, 1934—First semester begins.

Oct. 13 and 14—Michigan Education Association sixth district meeting.

Nov. 29 and 30—Thanksgiving recess.

Dec. 23—Christmas recess begins.

Jan. 2, 1935—School resumes.

Jan. 24—Mid-year commencement.

Jan. 25—First semester ends.

Jan. 28—Second semester begins.

April 18—Spring recess begins.

April 29—School resumes.

June 6—Commencement.

June 7—Second semester ends.

## Suit Asks Accident Damages Of \$50,000

Edward P. Hammond of Bloomfield Hills is the defendant in a \$50,000 damages suit filed last week in Wayne County Circuit Court as the result of a fatal automobile accident on July 17, Twelve Mile road and Woodward avenue.

The plaintiff in the suit is Fred DeCoppman, of Hazel Park, who was the driver of a car which collided with another driven by Edward P. Hammond, Jr. Mrs. Lucille Durbin, Hazel Park, and Mrs. Alice Van Becker, Highland Park, passengers in the DeCoppman's car, were killed. Hammond and Miss Peggy Chalmers, of Franklin road, were both seriously injured.

DeCoppman's counsel said the name of the car in the suit was that listed in the official records as the owner of the car, and that he did not know whether he was suing young Hammond or his father.

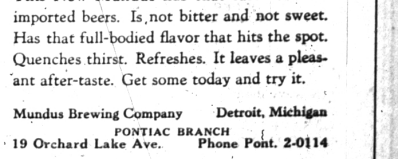
