Roy N. Reynolds, who is completing his first term as Sheriff of Oakland County, is seeking his second term. These figures are from the records in the Oakland County Board of Auditors' office. The net operating cost for 1933, the first year of Sheriff Reynolds' term, after subtracting the off-setting income, was \$30,618.90, or \$781.20 less than the drastically reduced budget fixed by the Board of Supervisors for the Sheriff's Department.

CAR HITS TREE, DRIVER KILLED

Passenger Seriously Injured In Bloomfield Hills Crash

One man is dead and another still lies seriously injured in St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital today as the result of an automobile accident on Opdyke road in Bloomfield Hills Friday morning.

Elmer F. Enders, 29 years old, of 19672 Andover street, Detroit, the driver of the car, which left the road and crashed into a tree about 100 feet south of Hickory Grove road, died of a fractured skull and other injuries without regaining consciousness Friday night, 16 hours after the accident.

The other victim, Joseph Vandelaar, 23½, Carlisle avenue, Highland Park, who was riding with Enders, sustained a fractured skull and right arm. The men were hurrying to work in a Pontiac automobile factory at about 7 A. M. when the accident occurred.

Sergeant DeLoe Anderson and Patrolman Stanley Kovern of the Bloomfield Hills police department investigated the crash, but will probably be unable to learn the details of how it happened until Vandelaar recovers.

Playground Wages Here Total \$1,507

The salaries of the 16 members of Birmingham's FERA summer recreation program totalled \$1,507.25 for the eight-weeks period, according to a detailed report of the project from Miss Miriam Brown, general supervisor, and submitted to the Board of Education Tuesday night. The program opened July 2 and closed Aug. 24.

The salaries were paid by the Federal Government but the City Commission and Board of Education each contributed \$98.86 for the purchase of playground equipment, the report shows. In addition, \$447.36 was raised by the Lions Club and other sources for maintenance of the Barnum School swimming pool, which was also operated as a part of the project. Expenditures for pool maintenance were \$445.32. Receipts from a water parent given Aug. 3 amounted to \$53.

The total attendance at playgrounds and pool for the eight weeks was 29,936. The average daily attendance was 801, and the number of individual children registered was 1,059.
