DRUNK DRIVER JAILED AFTER AUTO COLLISION
 Arrested for drunk driving after his automobile had crashed into the rear of another car on Woodward avenue north of Long Lake road, Adam Psenak, 31 years old, of 283 Central avenue, Pontiac, was sentenced to serve 30 days in the County Jail by Justice H. MAPLES START GRID PRACTICE
30 Candidates Report For First Workout; Squad To Be Light

 The 1934 Baldwin High School football squad held its first workout of the season Tuesday morning at Pierce Field. Coach Miles W. Robinson, who is beginning his fourth season as head football mentor, plans to meet with the team every morning at 9 o'clock until the opening of school Sept. 17. Although only 30 boys reported for the initial practice session, more than 60 are expected to be working out in the next 10 days.

It is still too early in the season to make any predictions as to what boys will make up the first eleven, or how this year's team will compare with 1933's outstanding outfit. But it is safe to say that the 1934 team will be both lighter and smaller than was the 1933 squad. In fact, when Coach Robinson purchased new pants for the team he bought them all in small sizes.

Schack Lost Through Injury
 Two of last season's backfield lettermen are eligible to play again this fall, one of them, Harry Schack, who injured his back last season, is still affected by the injury, and undoubtedly will be kept out of competition. Dick DeBeaubien, the other veteran, began working out Tuesday and promises to play a place as well as the regular Maple back toters.

Of the remainder of the squad, lettermen around whom Coach Robinson may mould his forward wall, Norman Clark and Warren Forster, both of whom played guard positions last season, and Guy Howard, an end, are all expected to win their second varsity B's this year.

Of the remainder of the squad, four men who were members of last season's second team should develop into good varsity material. Harold Minting, an end, Bub Filkins, a center, and Clifford M. Bride, who will probably be used at tackle or guard, all show promise. Chuck James, who ran the second outfit last season from the quarterback position, is one of the savvy contenders for that berth of the varsity this year.

Shelby Attorney Seeks State Post

 Removal of all taxes on real estate for state purposes is advocated by Thomas Read, Shelby attorney, who is a candidate for the Republican nomination for lieutenant-governor.

"I believe that the sales tax should be taken off necessities," Mr. Read says, "and that the Conservation Department should be put on a civil service basis. I believe in an old age pension, but an opposed to the head tax and will do all I can to have it removed and have the pension paid from other sources."

"I believe that all the schools in Michigan can be kept running, and that the teachers can be paid good wages, without any additional taxation. I believe in conservation of our natural resources. I believe that the parks and public lands of Michigan, especially of the Upper Peninsula, should be so developed as to attract to Michigan additional thousands of tourists. I believe that good roads should be further extended to these recreational centers."

Mr. Read was born in 1881 in Rochester, N. Y., was educated in the public schools of Michigan and is a graduate of the Ferris Institute, Big Rapids, and of the law department of the University of Michigan.

He served six years in the Michigan House of Representatives and was speaker of that body in 1919. He was lieutenant-governor for four years under Alex J. Groesbeck, and was state senator for two years. He has also served as a presidential elector.
