

TEAMS ACTIVE AT CRANBROOK

Outdoor Practice Begins For
Baseball, Track Squads;
Netmen Busy

Outdoor practice in two sports at Cranbrook School, track and baseball, were begun last week, while the tennis team continued to work out in the gymnasium.

In track, according to Coach Paul A. Thompson, the school will be represented by a well-balanced team, with prospects just as good as those of last year. The squad is large, and although only four netmen are returning, there are many potential letter-winners.

The outstanding performer will undoubtedly be Captain James Packard, who will compete in the hurdles, discus, shot-put, javelin and broad-jump, and has possibilities of breaking school records in these events. Other lettermen are Victor Pattengill in the pole-vault and broad-jump, and Anderson in the quarter mile, and Jack Whittlesey in the mile.

At present, the candidates for hurdles, weights, pole vault, broad jump and distance appear to be the most promising, while those for the high jump, 100-yard dash and 220 are more or less unknown quantities.

The diamond team, coached by Edward E. Yale, has a much better infield than last year, but an uncertain pitching staff. The infield will consist of Lloyd Taylor, first, Grant Valpey, a letterman, at second, Wellesley Kaye, F. Hunt, and George Hunt at third. The first practice game will be played next Tuesday.

The pitching burden this year will fall heavily on Dorr Lovett, experienced letterman of last year, who will be aided by William Jarvey and Paul Moffett. Jack Biera, another letterman, will handle the catching duties. The makeup of the outfield is also uncertain, with Bird, Ruthenburz, McPherson, Foster, and Hunt the outstanding candidates.

The tennis team, under Coach George T. Nickerson, will be built around three men who have had extensive experience, Captain James Talman, Otis Thompson, and a letterman, and Ben Marks. Talman is the best all around singles and doubles player Cranbrook has ever produced.

The success of the court team this year will depend on the development of three or four players, work with the three experienced men. Among the most promising of these candidates are James Watkins, Stephen Johnson, Mark Bisbee, Elliot Nichols and Hamilton White.
