

SEASON OPENS FOR 4 SQUADS

Track, Tennis, Baseball, Golf Teams To Make Debut At Cranbrook

Four athletic teams—track, tennis, baseball, and golf—will open their seasons at Cranbrook School this week-end.

The diamond team will go into action first, meeting the Detroit Country Day School squad at Cranbrook on Friday afternoon, and playing again Saturday morning against the Wing Lake A. C. The Crags baseball players have not met Country Day. Recently, since Cranbrook is resuming relations with the Detroit school this year after a lapse of several seasons, Wing Lake and Cranbrook broke even in two contests last spring.

Muskegon Junior College will provide the opposition to the other Blue and Gray teams on Saturday, competing in tennis and golf in the morning and track in the afternoon. All three contests will be at Cranbrook. Last year the track team beat Muskegon, 72 to 50, but Coach Thomsen expects "stronger opposition this year."

This will be the first time the tennis team has met Muskegon and the first time that a Cranbrook golf team has ever competed in a match.

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Rural School Student Wins District Spelling Bee Title

Because he was able to spell "Journies" correctly, Eugene Leavy, 14-year-old eighth grade student in the rural Daniel Whitefield School, Bloomfield Township, today is the spelling champion of the Birmingham district.

He won the title at the annual district bee held last Thursday afternoon at Baldwin High School, where he competed against 11 other students from schools in Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Bloomfield Village, Wing Lake and Bloomfield Township.

Eugene, who finished sixth in the district contest two years ago, will represent the district at the annual Detroit Metropolitan Bee at the Coliseum on May 10. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph J. Leavy.

Jean Potter Is Runner-up

Spelling slowly and deliberately, in a low, clear, audible voice, Eugene set his opponents down one by one in the one hour and 10 minute contest. The last to stand beside him was Jean Alice Potter, 11 years old, of the sixth grade of Adams School, Jean, whose father, Earl G. Potter, is a teacher in the Detroit public schools and secretary of the Birmingham Board of Education, tripped up on "Journies," which she spelled with an "ies" ending.

First to go down in the contest was Phyllis Millman of Quenton, who missed on "pines." The word "enforceable" eliminated two contestants, Bradley Hight of the Bloomfield Hills School and Jane Ellen Ford of Adams Junior

High School, both of whom began the word with an "i."

Martha Millinger of Baldwin Junior High School erred on "enliterations," and John Gillespie of Barnum Elementary School and Dorothy J. Oliver of Hickory Grove School both missed on "alotting." Thomas Livett of Linton School was the next to go down, spelling "browse" with a "u."

After Ruth Starnes of Barnum Junior High School had missed on "jurists," and Marie Black of Tuscarora School had stumbled on "heritage," only five contestants remained standing, and these five stayed determinedly for several rounds before Patricia Ripley of Pierce School finally was eliminated on "chocolate."

Betty Everett of Bloomfield Village School was the next to go down, missing on "terminus." "Procession" eliminated Kline of Wing Lake School, and this left only Jean and Eugene in the contest. They spelled without error for several rounds, before Jean finally missed on "Journies" and Eugene was crowned champion.

The contest was in charge of H. Earle, correspondent, principal of Pierce School, who also served as one of the judges. The other judges were Miss Adeline Cook, librarian of Baldwin Public Library, and Allen Tenny, managing editor of The Birmingham Eccentric. The words were pronounced to the contestants by Mrs. Carol, of the Baldwin High School faculty.

School champions of private schools in the Detroit area held their district spelling bee Thursday at Cranbrook School. It was won by Wiley Hitechek of Cranbrook, with Jacqueline Bell of Kingswood as runner-up.
