

MOST POPULAR GIRLS CHOSEN

Dorothy Porritt Leads Voting in Baldwin High School Contest

"The most popular girl at Baldwin High School" is the title which has been bestowed by her classmates today upon Dorothy Porritt, a member of the senior class which will graduate this June. She won the title by polling the highest number of votes in a popularity contest sponsored by "The Piper," student magazine.

With every subscription sold, the purchaser was given 10 votes which he was permitted to cast for his choice as the most popular girl student. Miss Porritt polled 1,400 votes, but was closely followed by Mildred White, another member of the June graduating class, who received 1,250. June Babcock, a junior, finished third in the contest with 690 votes.

Her popularity in no way interferes with Miss Porritt's studies or extra-curricular activities. She was recently elected to the National Honor Society, is the secretary-treasurer of her class, and is active in athletics.

Miss White also stands high in scholarship, and is a member of the advertising staff of "The Piper."

The subscription campaign, of which the popularity contest was a part, met with unexpected success, selling the staff 474 subscriptions, or 174 more than had been set as the quota. The drive was directed by Bernice Sweet and Clyde Bennett, circulation managers.

Petition Asks Board To Revive Washington Group

A petition requesting the Board of Education to reinstate the Washington Group as a permanent, school-sponsored activity at Baldwin High School is being considered by a special committee today, following its presentation at the Board's meeting last Thursday night. The committee is composed of Superintendent Charles W. Crandell, Principal Melvin C. Hart and Earl G. Potter, secretary of the Board of Education.

The petition is signed by 35 persons, most of whom are parents. The Board of Education virtually abolished the Washington Group as a school-sponsored institution following the banking holiday in 1932 in a resolution strongly advising discontinuance of preparations for the 1934 trip. The 1932 trip was made by the group as usual.

During a discussion which followed the reading of the petition, Mr. Potter expressed opposition to a restoration of school sponsorship of the activity. The annual trips with their attendant money-raising projects by which the students paid most of their expenses, placed a heavy burden on faculty members in charge of the group, he said.

He pointed out also that the School Board's action of two years ago does not prevent groups of students from organizing independently and going to Washington in a body. A group of 30 students which took that course this year left for the capital yesterday, accompanied by two faculty members and a parent.

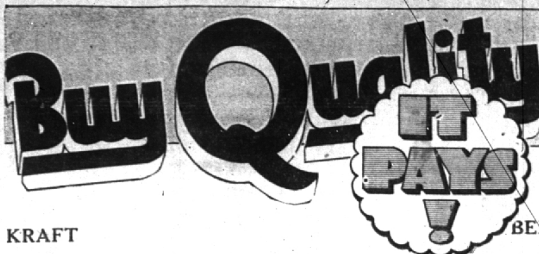
