MASTERING BRIDGE
As an average of six trump tricks are won at trump call, regardless of trump distribution, a sound suit call shows at least positions in the declaring hand, provided partner holds three trumps. Accordingly, the minimum trump strength required for opening bids are: A-J-10-X, K-Q-J-9-X, K-J-10-X, Q-J-10-X, or any suit of at least six cards.

The odds are 15 to 1 that an opening hand will hold five or more of your best suit. Therefore in rare cases very great side strength besides an opening hand, five apparently worthless cards as 1-10 on the hand shown below, which I held with Howard Cornwell as partner.

Bidding went: South, 1-Heart; North, 1-Spade; South, 2-No Trumps; North, 3-No Trumps. The opening lead was the 4 of diamonds, giving me three tricks; the suit, two tricks in spades without a finesse and four club tricks, or nine tricks before letting in opponents.

Postponed Games To Be Played Off Before Championship Series Begins

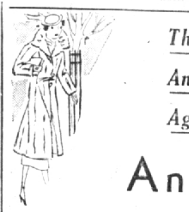

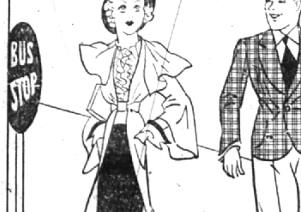
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
