

LOCALS OUTHIT BUT WIN, 3 TO 2

Merchants Score Victory At Goodrich On Four Safe Blows

The Birmingham Merchants got only four hits in nine innings of baseball playing at Goodrich Sunday, but they got three runs, which was just enough to beat the Goodrich nine, 3 to 2.

While Manager Joe LeFave's men found base hits few and far between they took every advantage of the breaks in the game, and were able to make good use of four errors by their opponents and a like number of bases on balls.

Art Wedge and Tony Schultz, who divided the pitching duties for Birmingham, allowed 11 hits between them, but kept the foe well in check in the pinches. Wedge hurled the first seven innings, and Schultz the last two.

Dick Forester, Birmingham first baseman, got three of his team's four hits, and it was his third single, coming in the ninth inning, that enabled the Birminghamites to win. Zagar had opened the inning with a single. He advanced on an error to second, from where he scored on Forester's hit.

In the sixth, the Merchants got two runs without the aid of a single hit. Jewell walked to open the inning. Kelly was safe on an error. Kelly also walked, and Jewell scored on a sacrifice by Schultz. Kelly came in later on a fielder's choice.

Goodrich scored once in the first on a walk and two singles, and added another in the seventh on a double and an error.

Crack Simon-Pures, Gathering In Cleveland For National Amateur In Fall, May Find Champ Little Hard To Beat

Cleveland becomes the mecca of Simon-pure golfers during the week beginning Sept. 9 when the faithful will trek 200 strong to the beautiful Country Club course, to try and pry Lawson Little loose from his National Amateur crown.

This is the largest entry list of qualifiers ever authorized by the United States Golf Association since its inception in 1895. Aug. 20 is the date set for the qualifying rounds at many golf clubs throughout the country to decide who among the stroking clan shall have the right to compete in this all-important tournament.

It is an uncommon feat for an amateur champ to defend his title successfully the year following its acquisition, although it has been accomplished before; but any golfer who can cop the British Amateur Championship twice in succession, as did Little in 1934 and this year, is a power to be reckoned with. Heady putting and strong iron shots characterize Little's play.

There will be no attempt to transform the course into an unbroken series of hazards to frustrate the contestants as was the case at Oakmont, Pittsburgh, earlier in the year. Its length has been increased, however, to about 6800 yards.

The event should attract an excellent attendance, since Cleveland hasn't entertained the National Amateur since 1907.

HEALTH LITERATURE ORDERED BY SCHOOLS

Miss Emma Christensen, Birmingham public school nurse, has ordered 37 pieces of school health literature for her students from the Oakland County Tuberculosis Association, the Michigan Tuberculosis Association announced this week.

With the opening of school only a few weeks away, the Oakland County Tuberculosis Association is putting into the mail this week 1,115 pieces of health literature requested by Oakland County school authorities. The ordering has been done this summer from a preview of materials sent out in May.

All of the pamphlets, booklets and posters being shipped are paid for with funds derived from the annual sale of tuberculosis Christmas Seals, with the exception of a new feature, a quantity of posters picturing 11 famous research scientists of history, printed for the Michigan Tuberculosis Association by a large firm of manufacturing chemists.

Creation and distribution of health literature represents one of the most important functions of Christmas Seal funds in Oakland County and constitutes an all-year job, officials said.

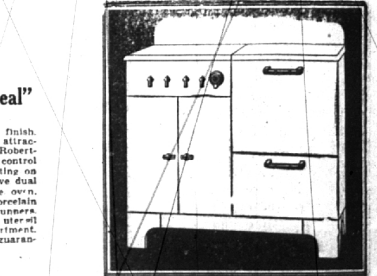
