

# BALDWIN WINS OPENER 14 TO 13

Local Team Plays Rochester and Cranbrook Friday Doubleheader

The Baldwin high school basketball team opened its 1935-36 season by squeaking out a close 14-13 victory over the Deacons High team, at Dearborn. The Maple quintet clearly had an edge on their opponents, taking the lead early in the contest and never relinquishing it.

Tomorrow night, December 13, Birmingham plays its first home game at the high school when it opposes Rochester at 7:00 p. m. At 4:00 p. m. tomorrow, the Maroon quintet will play Cranbrook at Cranbrook, and then return here for the Rochester game.

The Dearborn team was unable to solve Birmingham's zone defense until late in the second half, when they staged a brief but ineffectual rally. Dearborn's man to man defense enabled the Maroon sharpshooters to shake off their men and slip through to score. However, had Dearborn been able to capitalize on one of their free shots, they would have had a tie, or perhaps a win. Dearborn sank three of seven attempts, while Birmingham counted two out of seven, both by Don Fournace. Fournace and Capt. Cordner of the Black and Orange were the game's high scorers, each tallying six points.

Cordner on three baskets and Fournace on two baskets and two foul tosses. McBride and Birchong were the other Maple scorers, each collecting four points.

The score never varied more than four points difference throughout the contest. Birmingham led 6-3 at the half, and 11-7 at the end of the third quarter. Dearborn rallied desperately in the final stanza, netting six points, but the Maroon five collected the necessary three points to win before the final gun.

In the preliminary battle between the Birmingham and Dearborn second teams, the Maroon quintet bowed to the Orange and Black by a score of 25-19. Zinnbauer and Lawler were high scorers for Birmingham, each garnering four, while Ritenour of Dearborn collected seven and his mate Kellachow five.
