DR. H. H. HILLS' WIFE EXPIRES

Prominent Bloomfield Hills Matron Dies After Brief Illness

Following an illness of only four days, Mrs. Frances Pierce Hills, wife of Dr. H. H. Hills, retired physician and former vice-president in charge of distribution of the Packard Motor Car Company, died last Thursday night at her home on West Long Lake road, Bloomfield Hills. She was 54 years old.

Funeral services were held from the residence Saturday morning, and from the Pierce Funeral Home at both services.

Universal Fingerprinting Suggested In Bloomfield

The Bloomfield Hills City Commission Tuesday night heard a suggestion from Clarence E. Otter, police and fire commissioner, that all the residents of that city be fingerprinted.

Mr. Otter pointed out that the movement for universal fingerprinting is already gaining national headway, and suggested that it might prove worthwhile in Bloomfield Hills, especially among school students for ease of identification in case of kidnappings, accidents and other emergencies.

Fingerprinting might be made compulsory for school students, he said, although in the case of adults it would probably only be offered as a service which they could avail themselves of if they cared to do so. The records would be kept permanently by the police department, and the cost would be small, he said.

The commission took no formal action on the suggestion, Mr. Otter explaining that he preferred to talk first with school officials about the proposal.

WORKS PROGRAM SPURRED IN STATE

Planning Commission Calls Regional Meetings To Help Unify City Federal Funds

The State Planning Commission, which was organized last year, is now in the midst of a single powerful force to the end that the state may get its just portion of the new \$4,000,000,000 federal fund. President Roosevelt, for relief purposes, has called officials from all the states to a series of meetings.

Michigan has already been held at Detroit, Lansing, Battle Creek and Ishpeming. Officials to come are:

Michigan has been sent to every county seat and road commissioner, county clerk and mayor are present. The state is urging their attendance at the particular meeting.

Experts to Give Advice

Architects, engineers, and other representatives of the Planning Commission, together with heads of state departments at Lansing, will be present to advise the county representatives on more projects submitted or in preparation.

Two engineers have been named as field representatives of the Commission to be the 2,500 county, township, municipal and school administrators, who are represented at the regional meetings in drawing up their own plans in accordance with National Resources Board requirements.

POLICE ARREST 68 HERE IN JANUARY

December Total Drops Nearly 50 Per Cent; \$86 Collected At Violations Bureau

Arrests made by Birmingham police dropped from 123 in December to 68 in January, according to the monthly report of Miss Carrie Stokard, police clerk. Fines collected at the Traffic Violations Bureau totaled \$86.75 in January, as compared with \$166 in December.

Five of the January arrests were for felonies—two on charges of breaking and entering, and three for robbery. Four juveniles were arrested for larceny and one for a sex offense.

Arrests for misdemeanors included 23 for illegal parking, nine for speeding, eight for reckless driving, eight for violating traffic signals, three for drunk driving, two for drunkenness, one for disorderly conduct, two for investigation, one for driving without a chauffeur's license, one on a warrant, and one on a warrant for another jurisdiction.

Twelve traffic accidents occurred during the month, and four persons were injured, according to the report. Police answered 131 calls and investigated 20 complaints. Seven persons were bitten by dogs, and 12 lodgers were evicted for at police headquarters.

One stolen automobile was recovered, one larceny and six similar larcenies were reported. Two of the latter were cleared by arrests, one robbery was also cleared by an arrest.

Judge Holland served with the U. S. Army in the World War, and is a member of the American Legion, Pontiac Rotary Club, Pontiac Church, Ypsilon and Elks Lodges. Judge Holland was instrumental in drafting and enacting the present personal receivership law which insures payment of debts as fast as wages permit, but at the same time protects garnishments, thereby protecting a man's job and sparing the expense of law suits.

SONS, DADS TO HEAR DETROIT 'Y' WORKER

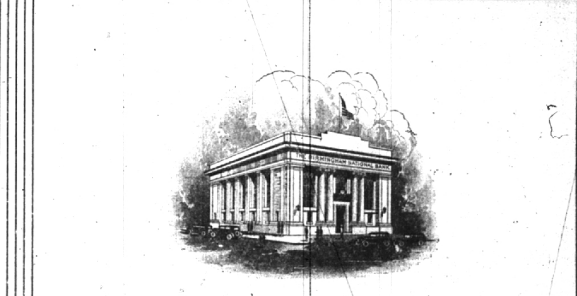
