State Ready With New Traffic Lights

Automatic Signals Will Be In-
stalled Here At Soon As
Weather Permits

Installation of traffic-actuated
lights on Woodward avenue at M-
16 and Woodward avenue at M-
17 will be begun by the State High-
way Department as soon as weather
permits. City Manager James W.
Parry has announced, following a
conference Saturday with H. E.
Hefron, a representative of the De-
partment.

The manager said Mr. Hefron
told him the contract for the in-
stallation has already been let, and that
the state will pay approximately a
quarter of the cost of maintaining
the lights in service, since Wood-
ward avenue is a state highway.

The state has already installed
this type of light at intersections
on Woodward avenue from Detroit
to Nine Mile Road, although all
are not yet in service, Mr. Parry
said. The lights are actuated by
pressure pads placed beneath the
pavement of intersecting streets,
operating so that the green light is
automatically tripped for oncoming
cars.

Installation of the new lights
here will involve placing of the
lights at Oakdale and avenue in sepa-
rate poles closer to each other than
they are now placed, and the removal
of the lights at Brown street to
opposite corners, Mr. Parry said.

transmitter, but pointed out that
these could easily be learned and
avoided by drivers of the police
cars. These "dead spots," he said,
seem to follow the course of the
River Rouge Valley. Mr. Braun ex-
plained that whereas the first year
the system is in operation, messag-
es will be transmitted only from
Royal Oak to the police cars, the
system is such that it can be re-
tamped for the sending of messag-
es from the cars to the station,
and even from car to car.

Tests To Be Made

He said that working tests would
probably be taken next week, and
that the system should be in op-
eration a week or two later.

While the Commission gave no
definite answer on whether Bir-
mingham would join the system,
Commissioners Luther Heacock and
Lawrence Hubert expressed them-
selves in favor of it, and Mr. Braun
was given the tentative promise of
a final answer next Monday night.
