Three Rirk-Wise Old Men of Gotham Help Rangers Do An About-Face and Make Marvelous Spurt to the Fore

Diamond fans of pre-war vintage recall fondly the glorious 1914 drive of the Boston Braves, when, from last place on July 4, they battered through all opposition to the National League pennant and a niche in baseball's Hall of Fame at the season's end.

Neither before nor since has such a concerted drive taken place on the diamond; but a comparable feat has recently been accomplished on the rink, as the whoops of thousands of fans have testified.

From the opening gun of the hockey season right down to New Year's Day, the New York Rangers had played so colorfully that it began to look as if vigor might be set in. The hitherto invincibles were going nowhere fast. Ranger fans shook their heads gloomily.

And then the New Year arrived. Maybe it was a resolution or something; anyway, the vets decided they'd get their second wind, and with the fury of demons, literally smashed their way from the tail-end position to the top of the heap on Feb. 12.

Three youngsters, Charlie Mason, Bert Connolly and Lester Patrick, Jr., son of the team's manager, deserve their need of praise. But the big bequests belong to three veteran Rangers: Frank Boucher and the two Cook brothers, Bun and Bill.

Ased as packsters go (Boucher's 32, Bun 31 and Brother Bill 26), these decrepit seniles forced the furious pace that netted win after surprising win and brought the Rangers up in the vanguard of the American Division.

In direct contradiction of baseball scouts who mourn about the dearth of good baseball material in this day and age, Frank Navin, president of the champion Detroit Tigers, goes out on a limb with the statement that good ball players are more abundant today than ever before.

He goes on to say that although the oldsters were good, they stood out prominently only because they were placed against a background of mediocrity.

Maybe Navin can direct his scouts to a spot where right-hand hitting outfielders and good reserve
