MAPES ROSE IN LAST HALF

Lead, Ferndale Cagers Early In Game, But Trail At End, 29-21

After a battle for nearly two periods, the Baldwin High School basketball team faltered in the final two stanzas and finally fell before the Balancers of Lincoln High School, Ferndale, Friday night on the Ferndale court. The Mapes led, 2 to 2, at one time in the first period, but the Lincoln team gradually gathered steam, led by one point at the close of the half, and held an eight-point lead, 20 to 21, when the final whistle blew.

The first period gave indications that the game would be a shooting battle between Don Partlow, Baldwin guard, and Harry Wilson, Ferndale forward. Wilson's six points in the initial chapter, and the only Lincoln scores in that period and Partlow's tossed in two beautiful long shots from mid-court. The Ferndale coach sent in a substitute with explicit directions to stop Partlow, and Wilson's one more point during the entire evening.
