PLEDGES ECONOMY IF ELECTED JUDGE

A. Floyd Blakelee
Blakelee, Former Prosecutor, States Platform As Circuit Bench Candidate

A. Floyd Blakelee, for 21 years an avowed Plankite attorney, has announced his candidacy for one of the three Circuit Court Judgeships to be voted on Mar. 4. Mr. Blakelee, a Republican, served as Oakland County prosecutor from 1921 to 1924, was chairman of the County Republican Committee from 1925 to 1927, and a member of the Republican State Central Committee from 1929 to 1931. He is married, and the father of two children.

Economical reforms in the conduct of the Circuit Court constitute the chief plank in Mr. Blakelee's platform. He believes that much of the waste in time and expense can be eliminated, and pledges himself to bring about these measures if elected.

"I believe that any lawyer who is elected to the high office of circuit judge of this county should remember that, although he has become a judge, he is after all only an employee of a big corporation owned and controlled by the taxpayers of his county. He should be ever mindful of the fact that the taxpayers expect him to be not only fair and honest to all litigants in his court, but that his department be handled by him with the same careful economy of time and money as a department in any big business corporation would be handled," said Mr. Blakelee.

"He should cooperate with the County Board of Supervisors who are, after all, only trying to do their job as careful guardians of the taxpayers' money and help them make the courts as light a burden as possible.

"While realizing that many praise-worthy advances have been made in the conduct of the courts by the Board of Supervisors, he has convinced me that our courts are in need of greater progress toward economical operation; many changes can be made to speed up the trial of cases and lighten the burden of the courts. vexatious delays to litigants, witnesses and lawyers. Adjudgments should be granted only when some great emergency has arisen. Outside judges should not be called in at an additional expense to the taxpayers, excepting when the local judges are all personally interested in the subject-matter of the suit. Long recesses should be avoided and as full a day's work accomplished as would be expected in any employment.

"I do not believe that these reforms would in any way lessenthe dignity of the court but on the contrary would help to create in the minds of the people a greater respect for that institution.

"I believe my past record as a private practitioner and as prosecuting attorney attests to my ability, common-sense and fairness and is a guarantee of my promise to the electors of Oakland County that, if elected, I shall long foremost in my mind this thought, 'Fairness, not only to the litigant, but the taxpayer as well.'
