### Students Of Two Schools To Stage Chinese Fantasy

Production of "The Yellow Jacket" by combined groups from Cranbrook and Kingswood Schools, on or about May 1, will mark the culmination of Cranbrook dramatic activities for this year.

"The Yellow Jacket," by George C. Hazelton and Benrimo, is a Chinese play presented in the Chinese manner. It combines a beautiful and fantastic story with the humorous circumstance of the property man on the stage. The play calls for a large cast, including a Chinese orchestra.

The Ergasterion Club, Cranbrook dramatic organization, will represent the boys' school in the production, while no definite group will represent Kingswood. Carl Womberger, Ergasterion advisor, and Miss Helen Hoss, Kingswood dramatic instructor, will direct the production. It is hoped that the co-operation of the Cranbrook and Kingswood schools in constructing scenery, two performances of "The Yellow Jacket" are contemplated, one at Cranbrook and another at Kingswood.

In addition to "The Yellow Jacket," a series of one-act plays will be given at Cranbrook during the winter and early spring on dates that have still to be set. The plays are intended as try-outs to uncover new talent, and will be directed by Mr. Womberger with the assistance of Ergasterion members. The first of these productions will be "Two Crooks and a Lady," a Harvard-Forty-Seven Workshop play. Main roles will be taken by Richard Hinchshaw, Warner Forester, Wiley Hitchcock and Jervis McMechan.

"The Ghost at March Heath," recently written by Mr. Womberger, will be the second of the series. The cast has not yet been selected, but among those trying out for parts are Grant Holmes, Wellesley Kaye, Dick Kern, William Vawter, Jack Ormond, and Grant Valpey.

### ACORN'S DRUB MAPLE

Royal Oak Grabs 16-11 Decision With 2 Goals In Closing Minutes

The annual battle royal between the basketball teams of Royal Oak and Baldwin High Schools was held on the latter's court Friday evening, and for the second time in two years the Acorns came away with a victory by a close margin. The game was either team's until the final minutes of play, when the Royal Oaks found the hoop for two field goals, giving them a 16 to 11 decision.

It was truly a "Sweet" night for the Oaks. Ten of their 16 points were accounted for by Harold Sweet, the team's lead forward. It was a throw by Sweet that sent Royal Oak into the lead late in the third period, and it was Sweet again who gave the Acorns a substantial lead at the close of the game.

Although the fray was not a good exhibition of basketball, it was the type of battle that proves interesting to the fans, and the audience at Friday's game was the largest that has been the Maples in action this season. The Royal Oak team, which was defending a record of four wins and no defeats, had a tougher time in handling the Maples than had been expected, but they were just able to keep the pace. The bulk of the scoring was done in the last half. Neither of the two sides was able to score in the first stanza, and only six points were chalked up in the second period, four by Royal Oak. The Acorns had increased their lead by only one point when the third quarter ended, with the score 12-9 in their favor.

Royal Oak led at the close of every period, but in both the second and third stanzas the Maples scored and drew even. The first score came in the second period, when Bud Harris, Baldwin center, nabbed a long pass under the basket and dropped the ball through the hoop. Then Sweet connected with two shots from the field, while the Maples were held scoreless for the remainder of the period.

When the third quarter was half over, the Acorns had a three-point lead. "Red" McBride then put the Maples back in the running by scoring a pair of field goals, but again Sweet came to his team's rescue and gave the Acorns a single-point advantage with another shot from the field. Captain Albreck also scored for the Acorns before the period ended.

Led by Don Giddings, forward, the Royal Oak reserve team also won, defeating the Baldwin reserves, 22 to 11, in a preliminary.
