MAHLE TEAM BOYS TRICE

B. H. S. Cagers Beaten By Wayne, 25-15; By East Detroit, 35-13

The cage team of Baldwin High School suffered its fourth and straight defeat of the season last week. On Thursday evening the Mahles journeyed to East Detroit and were taken into camp by the high school quintet there, 25 to 15. East Detroit handed the Maroon outfit its worst defeat of the season Saturday night on the Detroit court, the final count being 35 to 13.

In both games, one man stood out prominently on offense for the winners. Jerry Holmes, Wayne center, scored as many points as the rest of the team combined.

B. H. S. CAGE TEAM TO PLAY ST. MARY'S

Their season half over, the cagers of Baldwin High School will meet St. Mary's of Orchard Lake Friday evening on the Lakemans court. Of their first seven games, the Mahles have lost five and won two.

The Royal Oak team which found it hard to beat the Mahles two weeks ago by a 16 to 11 count, encountered little difficulty in defeating St. Mary's early this season, 20 to 10.

Bob Harris, who has been one of Coach Franklin Whitney's most reliable men, played his last game for Baldwin against East Detroit. Although his performance in that contest was in no way outstanding, he played one of the best games of his career, against Wayne.

Wayne's Unchallenged

The East Detroit team which faced the Mahles Saturday was far superior to the squad that defeated Baldwin twice last year. The Detroiters out-pointed the Mahles in the first round of the regional tournament last spring, but had to fight at every turn to top the Baldwin team. Saturday night they took the lead with the first score of the game and breezed through the remainder of the tilt without once having its advantage threatened.

The initial Detroit score was made before the tilt was well under way and at quarter time the Detroiters stood on the top of a 12 to 2 count. The winners held a lead of a dozen points at the half and the three quarter Mahles found them out in front, 29 to 9. The Mahles found it practically impossible to work the ball under their opponents' basket, but Birmingham's usually effective zone defense proved no puzzle to the home team. Desperate by the time the third period began, the Baldwin team started shooting from long range, but found the mark rarely.

Burt Diemer, who has been one of the Baldwin mainstays, injured his knee in the Wayne game and as a result was unable to play Saturday. He is expected to be in shape for the same this week, however.

Wayne Starts Reserves

The Wayne game was much closer than the East Detroit tilt. Throughout the first half the Mahles held the lead and the play of both teams gave promise of a Baldwin victory, but the squad the Mahles had outpointed, 9 to 7, in the initial two stanzas proved to be the Wayne reserve five.

When the second half opened, and the Wayne first team went into action, Holmes netted three long throws in a row, the only scoring done in the third period, it throughout the remainder of the tilt.
