A new movement to organize junior and juvenile music clubs in Birmingham will be launched by the Thursday Musicales with initial meetings of the new groups at the Community House Sunday. Mrs. William Lloyd Kemp, president of the Musicales, has appointed Mrs. W. Whitling Raymond as organization chairman for the project.

Assisting Mrs. Raymond as co-chairman in the movement will be Miss Virginia Lamborn, and Mrs. Earl G. Potter, who will be in charge of the juveniles, and Mrs. Raymond Reilly, who will and Mrs. Raymond in organizing the juniors.

The juvenile group, which will include children up to and including 12 years of age, will meet at 2 P. M. and the junior group, for young musicians between the ages of 13 and 18 years, will meet at 4 P. M.

At the first meeting Sunday, officers will be elected and plans discussed for future programs. One club in each group will be organized as a start. Mrs. Raymond announced, and others will follow as the demand increases. Although counselors will attend, each meeting will be conducted by the children, who will also present the programs.

As an aid in organizing the movement, the committee has appealed to Birmingham music teachers for their co-operation in assisting pupils to prepare programs. If present plans succeed, it is the hope of the Musicales to have the juvenile and junior groups present the March program for the senior club.

If juvenile and junior members vote to join the National Federation of Music Clubs, they will become eligible to compete in the annual contest sponsored by the National Federation, to be held this year in Grand Rapids.
