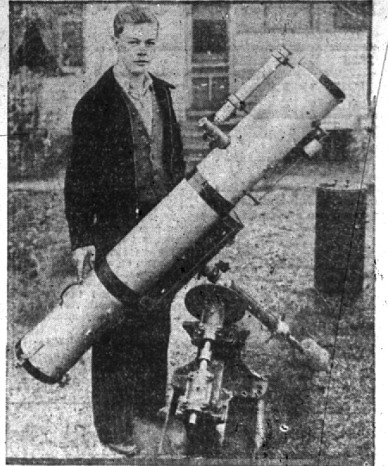

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BALDWIN SETS NEW ENROLLMENT MARK

772 Students Registered First Day Of New Semester At High School

Student enrollment at Baldwin High School, which has been steadily increasing for the past two years, hit a new peak Monday, the first day of the second semester, when a total of 772 students were registered.

Enrollment figures from other Birmingham schools are not yet compiled, but Superintendent Charles W. Cranfield stated that they would be about the same as they were last semester.

The largest group enrolled in one class at Baldwin is 145, registered in the 10th class. The enrollment by grades follows:

7th grade, 57; 8th grade, 54; 9th grade, 85; 10th grade, 217; 11th grade, 165; 12th grade, 181; post graduates, 10.
