

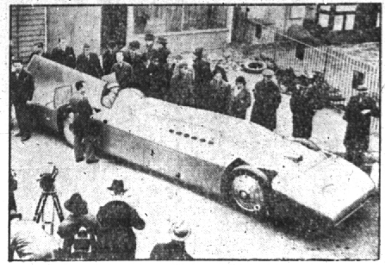
2 TEAMS MEET FOR LOOP LEAD

to

Residents of the City of BIRMINGHAM

For General Primary Election

Monday March 4, 1935

To vote at this election, all persons must be registered in the City by Saturday, February 23rd, 1935, at 5 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.

Citizens of the United States, 21 years old, who have resided in the State of Michigan six months and in the City of Birmingham twenty days at the time of voting are eligible.

TO REGISTER, call at the City Clerk's Office in the Municipal Building on or before Saturday, February 23rd, during business hours (8 A. M. until 5 P. M. Eastern Standard Time). The City Clerk's office will be open Monday, February 11th, from 8 A. M. until 8 P. M.

Any registered elector who has moved since he last voted, may cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer at any time before Monday, February 11th, at 8 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.
