ORDINANCE

Number 208

Amending the Building Code

The City of Birmingham Ordains:

That section 1.107 (a) of Ordinance number 184 be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

1.107 (a) Before any permits are issued, the applicant therefor shall pay to the City Treasurer the fee for same in accordance with the following schedule:

Heating installations in existing buildings	\$ 5.00
Oil burning installation, including tanks of not over 1000 gallons capacity	5.00
Oil burner installation, burner only	2.00
Wrecking buildings	1.00
Moving buildings over public right-of-way	25.00
Moving buildings over private property	only

NOTE: The fee for moving buildings, which are not over 12 feet wide and do not contain over 2500 cubic feet, shall be \$5.00. The deposit required under section 1.107 (e) shall be \$100.00 in such cases.

NEW BUILDINGS

Group I—Churches, theatres, office buildings, hotels, schools and hospitals.	\$ 0.45
Group II—Apartments	0.40
Group III—Residences and stores	0.35
Group IV—Factories and warehouses	0.30
Group V—Sheds	0.20

Temporary permit 25% in excess of standard fee.

Renewal of temporary permit 1.00

The fee for additions and alterations shall be at the rate of \$1.00 per thousand dollars of the cost of such additions or alterations as estimated by the Building Inspector.

The minimum building permit fee shall be \$1.00

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication after the passage thereof.

Made and passed by the Commission of the City of Birmingham this 2nd day of January, A. D. 1935.

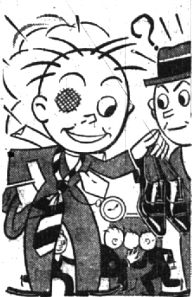
