GRAVEL PIT IS STILL PUZZLE
Bloomfield Hills Attorney Instructed To Ask Reduction On Contract

The Bloomfield Township gravel pit, which has been an elephantine problem in the laps of a succession of public officials for the past five years, is still a problem. Officials today are just as much puzzled about what to do with it as were their predecessors in office.

The question arose at the meeting of the Bloomfield Hills Commission Tuesday night, when Frank W. Atkinson, city attorney, said he believed the Pontiac Development Company, from which the township purchased the pit on contract, would be willing to make a considerable reduction in the unpaid balance on the contract—providing the township wants to keep it.

Inasmuch as the pit is one of the properties which is now owned jointly by the township and the Cities of Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills, the latter two must be consulted in any move toward completing payments on the contract, or returning the property to the Pontiac Development Company, if that is found to be legally possible. The original contract price was approximately \$105,000, of which about \$47,000, plus interest, is still unpaid.

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PROSPERITY CLINKS

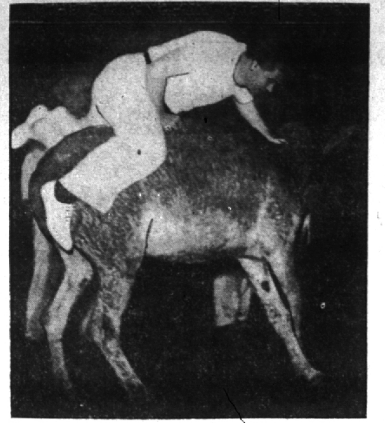
