What's What at a Glance

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Many politicians express the opinion that President Roosevelt's "share the wealth" message "took" much more strongly than he intended it to.

The opinion unquestionably was widespread among them that the president's purpose simply was to vacillate against the "share the wealth" microphone by interposing a mild, innocuous case of his own. It was his own present condition, and a violent attack of the rich.

Apparently the message conspicuously avoided any hint at a Presidential desire for "share the wealth" action at this congressional session. The interpretation widely placed on this omission is that the executive mansion was seeking to counteract Senator Huey P. Long, Father Coughlin and Dr. Townsend, but preferred to have the actual "share the wealth" suggestion go over until winter, trusting to the lapse of time to weaken it considerably by then.

F. D. R. VS. HUEY'S PLAN

President Roosevelt did not, as a matter of fact, advocate a "share the wealth" program in any such sense as was "share the wealth" as advocated by Senator Huey P. Long. He did not use the expression "share the wealth"—the Kingfish's expression.

Nevertheless, what he did say sounded so much like Huey's "share the wealth" slogan that newspaper headlines and editorial writers throughout the land generally have gone on the assumption that the President and Huey are demanding one and the same thing.

It suits the purposes of the Kingfish (as shrewd a politician as President Roosevelt himself) to take this view, declaring himself more than willing (anxious) to sacrifice his whole political future in behalf of a policy to which, undoubtedly, he feels sure the administration is not genuinely friendly—but a policy he has advocated, and to which the administration now has inadvertently committed itself.

GIVEN HIM THE "DISEASE"?

Roughly:

The idea of Senator Huey P. Long and the progressives generally, is to "divide the wealth"—to raise as much revenue as possible for the government, but to "divide wealth" regardless of revenue.

The Presidential plan is to raise revenue, incidentally dividing wealth—but, primarily, the thought is to raise revenue.

The two philosophies essentially are different.

The question is:

Hasn't President Roosevelt, trying to immunize the patient against the "share the wealth" microbe, with his revenue-raising vaccine, inoculated his subject with the honest-to-goodness disease?

NEW YORK.—Some of the younger Republicans who have recently read America's history have cautioned the Old Guard to go more slowly on saying that everything President Roosevelt suggests is "unconstitutional."

The younger men point out that Mr. Roosevelt may be maneuvering the Republicans to extinction. The President is a student of American history.

Under Presidents Jefferson and Madison, the Federalists, corresponding to the Republicans of the present day, opposed every measure as unconstitutional. Finally, they went to absurd lengths, tried to thwart the will of the people and the growth of the nation—and went to extinction.

The Federalists had become merely a negative party.

JEFFERSON'S VIEW

In after years, Thomas Jefferson, surveying the rise of the Jeffersonian Republicans (the present day Democrats) and the fall of the Federalists, wrote these comments to John Adams:

"One of the questions on which our parties took different sides, was the improbability of the human mind in science, in ethics, in government, etc."

"Those who advocated a reformation of institutions, pari passu with the progress of science, maintained that no definite limits could be assigned to progress."

"The enemies of reform on the other hand denied improvement and advocated steady adherence to the principles, practices and institutions of our fathers which they represented as the consummation of wisdom and the acme of excellence beyond which the human mind never could advance."
