TUBERCULOSIS WAR TRACED

County Sanatorium Head
Describes Man's Conquest
Of White Plague

The astounding and dramatic advances made by the medical profession in its warfare on tuberculosis were described to Birmingham Rotarians in the Community House Monday noon by Dr. George A. Sherman, superintendent of the Oakland County Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

Tracing briefly the history of man's slow but certain conquest of the "white plague," Dr. Sherman characterized tuberculosis as "the last remaining important contagious disease."

"Tuberculosis is definitely on the decline," he said, "and science predicts that it will eventually become quite a rare disease." Already, he pointed out, the terror of mass infection has been eliminated, and even individual cases of the disease are considered rare in some communities. Not many years ago, he recalled this same disease was taking an annual toll in the United States of 500 lives for every 100,000 persons—by far the largest death rate attributable to any one disease.

Fight Gains Impetus
Conquest of tuberculosis, starting slowly at first, has gained impetus with the years, Dr. Sherman declared.

"The status of this warfare of five years ago is ancient history today, and it is still changing rapidly," he said. "We're a great deal more honest with ourselves now than we used to be. If we find out that one of our pet discoveries of former years has become obsolete, we throw it over and forget about it instead of clinging to it jealously for sentimental reasons."

He spoke at some length of the prominence surgery has taken in the treatment of tuberculosis, and emphasized the importance of the work done of preventorium, where children infected with tuberculosis undergo necessary care and attention to prevent the disease from developing into its advanced stages when the child reaches adulthood. Tuberculosis can now be cured in 98 per cent of the cases where it is brought to the attention of physician in the early stages, and given proper treatment, he said.

Praises Michigan's Role
Dr. Sherman was high in his praise of the role Michigan has played in the anti-tuberculosis crusade. "I don't want you to think Michigan is doing everything it could do, because it isn't," he said, "but it is making great progress, especially in comparison with what some of the other states are doing."

Oakland County is also to be commended for its work in stamping out the disease, he said, pointing out that anyone infected with tuberculosis in the county may start receiving treatments at the county sanatorium within 24 hours.

Considerable credit for the steady elimination of tuberculosis in recent years is due to young physicians who have devoted their careers to research, rather than turning to the more lucrative fields of private practice, Dr. Sherman said. "I know of nothing more dramatic than civilization's fight against tuberculosis," he declared. "To know what has been accomplished in this endeavor makes one proud to be a member of the medical profession."

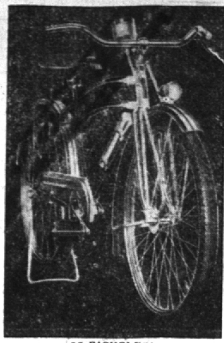
