## 185 Floral Entries Bloom For Annual House Show

All the charm of June gardens seemed to be transplanted to the Community House Wednesday afternoon when the Birmingham Unit of the Women's National Farm and Garden Association held its annual spring flower show.

Virtually every flower blooming at this time of the year was seen as an exhibition specimen, or arranged in some artistic scheme to enhance its charm.

Exhibitors in the local unit this year confined themselves to classes for artistic arrangements in various designs, and to the displaying of the specimens instead of setting tables as in previous years. That privilege was extended to guest units in neighboring communities.

According to Mrs. Robert H. Daisley, general chairman, the show this year exceeded expectations of the unit with a total of 185 entries, representing more than 100 exhibitors. The number of entries for 1935 is more than twice that of a year ago when only 75 entries were recorded.

Awards were based on the number of points won in the various classes. Mrs. E. H. McKinney and Mrs. W. A. P. John tied with a score of six and one-half points each.

Those winning second prizes were Mrs. Albert Clark, Mrs. Atwell R. Oatman, Mrs. E. B. Caldwell and Elizabeth Richey. Those receiving third prizes were Mrs. Brown, Mrs. M. S. Kilo, who was awarded three third prizes.
