Dr. Myers Tells How To Aid Children Rout Their Fears

A FEW YEARS ago Dr. Elmer R. Hagman made, at the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station, July University, a study of children who had overcome their fears.

He found that the most common fear of most children is of the dark. Children who are afraid of the dark, of dogs, of doctors, of storms, of water and darkness.

There also are, as Dr. George Stoddard, director of the Iowa Research Station points out, many fears which are children's fears.

association with painful experiences. He suggests that if we substitute "deluges" for "storms" we could think of the six leading fears of the young child as dogs, doctors, deluges, deep water, darkness and derivations.

As I have said before, we best help the child overcome his fears by means of gradual adaptation. Instead of exposing him to a dog in a way that would increase his fears, we help him keep a safe distance from the dog and to learn very gradually to approach it.

Toy May Help
A toy might help, then, being tied or kept securely in a simple lantern, or a dog which will not jump or bark at the child, and which he sees other children approach or touch without show of fear, and which it may take a long, long while for the child to overcome
