director:

Q. (To Mr. DeMille, who is
lunching in his immense suite at
the Waldorf, in his shirt-sleeves,
no tie, collar open at the throat.
Secretaries flutter about, as do
waiters. Mr. DeMille is very im-
pressively a director of the old
swashbuckling school; you are
sure that if you look under the
table you will see puttees.) What
next, Mr. DeMille—now that you
have finished "The Crusades."

A. I think I shall do "Samson
and Delilah." Yes, I'm sure I shall
do "Samson and Delilah." Not the
operatic version, you know, but
the real story of Samson.
Samson is one of the most mis-
understood people in history.

Q. You mean about the hair-

A. No, I mean Samson's tender
romance. You know, he cut out
from home and went to the city,
where he married an heiress. Her
folks didn't go for him. They were
looking for him all the time, to get
him. Then Samson took a walk
one day and met Delilah down by
the river's edge. Why, I know of
a real life story, involving an heiress,
which was almost the same
thing. There's a great love story.

Q. Were you satisfied with your
most recent picture, "The Cru-

pictures?

A. It's true that no picture I
ever made which contained a bath
tub lost money. But I am not su-
perstitious. I could not put a bath
tub in "The Crusades" without
straining the plot, so I said to my-
self, "To hell with the bath tubs
in this picture." However, you
can tell your readers that people
are bathed in burning oil in "The
Crusades"—that there is a "boudoir
scene and that there is a com-
edy scene in which the hero
falls into a blacksmith's cooling
vat. That's almost as good as a
bath tub, isn't it? Oh, yes—there
will be bath tubs in "Samson and
Delilah." The first bath tubs in
the world will be in my next pic-
ture.

Q. Will you make your next pic-
ture in color?

A. No, not unless by that time
engineers have invented a system
of pastel colors for photography.
The present colors are too bright.
It seems to me. But mention that
I have not yet seen the newest
color picture, "Becky Sharp."

Q. What are your politics, Mr.
DeMille?

A. You can put me down as a
Republican who has voted the

The choir will sing Mr. Koepfer's
arrangement of "Ave Maria" by
Rosewicz and "Jesu Salvator
Mundi." "Movement IV" by
Fellmann will precede the ben-
ediction. The recessional will be
"Praise Ye the Father" by
Gounod.
