A procession about the church will include all the choirs, numbering about 125 persons. On reaching the sanctuary, the choir will sing "Prayer of Thanksgiving."

When all the candles have been distributed and before the congregation recites the affirmation of faith, the members will stand in silence while the bellman in the tower plays two numbers on the carillon, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past," and "Faith of Our Fathers."

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6,000 AT SCIENCE CHURCH MEETING

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MODEL HOME TO ILLUSTRATE NHA

Erection of House in Birmingham Will Be Part of National Housing Observance

Plans and specifications for a model home in Birmingham have been prepared by the Broadfield Organization, Inc., real estate brokers, and entered for participation in the National Housing Day observance on June 15. It has been announced by E. J. Butler, president of the organization.

Although the site for the home has not been definitely determined, it will be some place on the west side, Mr. Butler said. Ground will be broken on or about June 15, when it is expected that about 2,000 new houses will be begun simultaneously all over the country.

This will be the first occasion of the kind in the history of the nation, and it is expected to call dramatically to the attention of prospective home owners and the public generally the benefits to be derived from Title Two of the National Housing Act, and to serve notice that home building is going forward again after five years of virtual paralysis of the building industry," Mr. Butler said.

"Under Title Two of the Act, prospective owners with assured incomes may secure from qualified private financial institutions, government-insured mortgages up to \$10,000, with a maximum of 20 years to pay, and they may borrow up to 80 per cent of the total investment, including site."

The new Birmingham home, which will meet all the property standards of the National Housing Act, will be built by John C. Roth, building engineer, and will be a suburban tract of six detached and two two-lot, Mr. Butler said.
