Show Fosters Gardening As Art In Amateur Class

Garden lovers of Birmingham will have an opportunity to test their ability in showmanship by entering the open classes for non-members in the annual flower show sponsored by the Birmingham and Garden Association to be held in the Community House Wednesday.

The open classes were included in the schedule by Mrs. Robert H. Dinsley, general chairman to encourage amateur gardeners in exhibiting specimen blooms and to try out their originality in the artistic arrangement of flowers.

The show this year promises to be unique, with a variety of classes. Particularly original is the "free for all" class in artistic arrangement, in which members may give vent to their most original ideas without any restraining rules or regulations to cramp their style.

Other Classes
Then there is the "study in contrasts," in which the artistic ability of the exhibitor will prove in good stead.

Another type of artistic arrangement will be that in which

flowers and container are in shades or tones of one color. Daintiness is a charm which many flower-lovers can not resist. To these, the class for miniature arrangements of not more than six inches over all, will, no doubt, have a strong appeal. Then there are modern arrangements, and arrangements of wild flowers for exhibitors who have floral hobbies for either.

Flowers arranged under glass come under another classification, as do the "tables of yesterday," and shadow boxes. Invitation has been extended to units in neighboring communities to enter table arrangements, and another group of non-members. Small girls ranging from five to 10 years may set tea-party tables and enter them, and their older sisters may enter small tables or tea-wagon arrangements.

Judges Named
There will be the regular classes for specimen blooms and those interested chiefly in the type of flower their gardens can produce. One may enter iris, roses, peonies, pansies, columbine and zoned plants.

Judges for the show will be Mrs. W. Beresford Palmer, Jr., of Grosse Pointe, Miss Margaret Hendrie, Miss Florence Stroh, and Mrs. Lee E. Josley.
