Attendance figures for the Saturday Club show that more than 50 percent of the children registered are boys. Mrs. Robert F. The figures also show, Mrs. Watt pointed out, that more than 50 percent of the children of eligible age for the club in the Birmingham school district have registered.

In the first section for eight year olds, 75 boys and 63 girls are enrolled. In the second section, for children nine and 10 years old, the figures show a registration of 116 boys and 106 girls. The total registration for both groups is 290, composed of 138 of the young children and 222 of the older group. The percentage of boys attending the first section is 54, and 52 percent of the children in the second section are also boys.
