Children Reared Properly, Even In Timber Rail Camp

"DR. GARRY MYERS: Dear Sir:— "Destructiveness should be re-
spected at first offense. Once when I was absent our younger boys and girls brought up in a better spirit than we. In a neighborhood a logging train and a logging camp where my husband and I were foreman, and the cooking for these men was done by myself and maid and the child of my three older boys, the girl took care of the smaller children."

"We always kept our own separate living quarters. A big husband built a dining room for the men to be in themselves. My boys, when no more than nine years old, waited on table and dressed the dishes in the men's eating room, and made the beds in the men's sleeping room. They often were alcohol bottle and always tobacco in evidence in the sleeping room, but the boys loved any of it."

Respect for Property

"The children were always allowed to know the planning of the household, and the older ones always helped to teach the younger ones to respect other people's property. There was always small change left around, and if the boys found money loosely scattered in a bed they invariably asked the one who slept there about it first. Some of these children even tried to keep any of this money for themselves. They were taught by us that it was not theirs. I did not watch or criticize my children. We talked things over and planned to gether for the best of all. So far I have never had any trouble this way."

Admire the Family?

"In such a way a father had the mood of the older children train the younger ones to respect other people's property rights."

You and I must admire this family. We would like to know more about them. There must have been love and sympathy and understanding, tempered with firmness and holding of these children to standards of right conduct always made clear to them. It is not that no parent very successful in rearing children seems able to tell others just how real was done. How you and I would like to have visited in that home in the timber camp, and have seen the whole one relationship which must have prevailed within that family!"
