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CHURCHES TO OBSERVE.

WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

In cooperation with churches of all denominations the world over Birmingham churches will observe the annual World Day of Prayer for Mission at the First Methodist Church Friday from 2 to 4 P. M. The call to prayer for this year's observance is "Bear Ye One Another's Burdens."

In Troy, renomination over Floyd Lawrence, 351 to 144. Elmer Lovell won the Democratic nomination for clerk without opposition. The closest contest in Troy was that for the treasurer's nomination with three candidates from both parties in the field. John Truesdell, former treasurer, defeated Henry B. Eeman and E. T. Schooner for the Republican nomination, and Lloyd Nancearrow was victorious over Joseph Edgerton and Hugh Scott on the Democratic ticket.

Other contested nominations in Troy were won by Martin Stampf, Republican candidate for highway commissioner; Raymond Ferguson, Republican candidate for justice of the peace; and Jay Chatfield, Republican candidate for clerk of review.

In Southfield, Mrs. Fannie Adams, Republican incumbent, and Mrs. Oma M. Utley, Democrat, were not opposed for the nomination of clerk, and Lynn Everett, Republican, was re-nominated for clerk. Mr. Everett is virtually certain of election, since there was no Democratic candidate in the primaries.

Oliver H. Kirk, Birmingham attorney, was nominated by Southfield Republicans for justice of the peace, and also faces no Democratic opposition at the regular election April 1. Edward Stephens defeated James Kirchoff for the Republican nomination for highway commissioner, and will be opposed by Irving Johnson, Democrat, in the election.

Both Troy and Southfield Townships gave substantial pluralities to Francis L. Doty and George B. Hartwick, successful Republican candidates for Oakland County circuit judges in both townships. However, the third successful candidate, J. Russell Holland, trailed Harry J. Merritt and A. Floyd Edwards, who were defeated on the basis of returns from the entire county.

James Lynch, Frankie E. Morris and Samuel J. Patterson, successful Democratic candidates for circuit judge, ran well in both townships, and E. Lederle, who was re-elected county school commissioner, was also favored over his two opponents in both Troy and Southfield.

JACK PYLE HURT WHEN HIT BY CAR

Recoveries From Painful Injuries After Being Struck While Crossing Street

The many friends of L. N. Clark Pyle, 154 South avenue, are shocked by the news that he is recovering from painful injuries suffered last Friday evening when he was struck by an automobile while crossing Woodward avenue at Maple avenue.

The car was driven by Robert Poulson, 2107 Long Lake road. Pyle, who told police he was driving south and had crossed Woodward with the green light when Mr. Pyle stepped off the curb directly in front of his car. Doty said he was driving on 15 miles an hour, but was unable to avoid hitting Mr. Pyle with his right front fender.

Mr. Pyle was knocked to the pavement and suffered a fractured collar bone, severe scalp laceration and minor cuts and bruises about the body. He was taken to St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital, where he was removed to his home Saturday. Mr. Pyle is 23 years old.

Besides his parents, the boy is survived by two sisters, Dorothy Lucile, four years old, and Betty Louise, 10 months.

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
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
