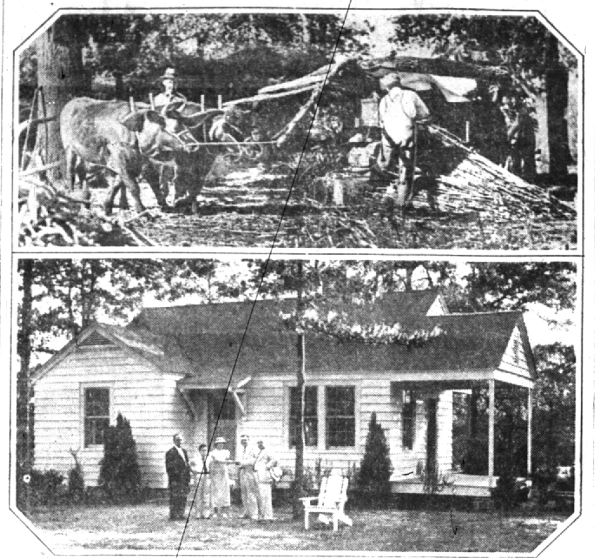

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'Transplanting' Programs Offer Great New Farming Opportunities

Throughout the United States and in the Alaska, many Americans are trying their hand at modern pioneering.

The general theme of the movement is "Escape from overcrowded land." To help his farther escape from "unproductive" land, Uncle Sam is providing new frontiers.

Up in Matanuska Valley, Alaska, a vanguard of several hundred colonists from the midwest is settling down happily in new surroundings.

New Land

They have found a new land from which they and their children will wrest a living to be started in a new valley, hilly, green, with white peaks and hills green with spruce and hemlock.

When their homes are completed, they are living in tents for the present. The colonists will begin to work the Wayne farm, which they will draw before it. It will be up to these hardy people themselves then to see that the promise given by the government is fulfilled.

Another great movement is under way in which Uncle Sam plans to transplant 61,000 midwesterners.

Buy Land Options

For months federal reclamation agents have toured Mississippi buying up land options, their ultimate goal being 8,000,000 acres, or about one-seventh of the state's area.

This land, all non-productive, will be reinfused to create a vast reservoir.

SPLENDID DEFENSE

IN THE VARIOUS tournaments and clubs where leading experts play, I often see perfect defensive play, but it is rare to have a hand sent in which illustrates that feature of the game, probably because the last thing which players learn is perfect defense. The clearer of the hand shown today is, however, a man who realizes when he encounters the splendid defense East offered. Had not East doubled the call it is safe that no player sitting South would have more than fulfilled the contract. It was the lone clue to proper end play, and South deserves due credit for trapping his opponent. I regret South's prohibiting me from mentioning his name.

Hiding west: South, 1-Diamond; North, 2-No Trumps. I think that his better call would have been 2-Clubs, which probably would have resulted in a no trump game contract, for a higher score than the 100 points due for 3-Hearts; North, 3-Diamonds, which East doubled.

The opening lead was the 10 of hearts, which declarer's K won.

Four leads of trumps followed, to pull the last opposing one. East let go his two lowest clubs and the 9 of spades. The Ace and K of spades were played, leaving East with the good Q of that suit.

The Q of hearts won the eighth trick. West showed out and East's ♠A7 ♣Q763 ♠KJ4 ♠AQ53 ♠QJ109 ♠982 ♠8 ♠K970 ♠AK54 ♠AQ1098 ♠84

J-9 blocked further immediate attempts to run that suit off, so South took his Ace of hearts for the ninth trick, leaving East with the top heart, but forcing that opponent to let go one of his four cards (good spade, good heart or a club from the K-9).

East could not let go his good

heart without giving the declarer a certain small slam. The discard of the Q of spades was perfectly safe, but then South would have taken dummy's Ace of clubs, without any finesse and fulfilled his contract, giving the doubler one heart and one club trick at the end. East's only possible chance to defeat the contract was to have his K of clubs, hoping that the declarer would risk the Q of clubs in finesse, trying for an overtrick and to go down.

East discarded his 9 of clubs, as nonchalantly as if West held the K and East held the J or 10. South led a club, West played low. The declarer is not a timid player and he would have risked the finesse had it been necessary, but he suspected East, went up with dummy's Ace, to insure his contract, and so made 6-odd, having to give East a heart trick at the end.
